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TRANSITION TO ADOBE (PUREEDGE)

1. What are the names of the agencies again that still use PureEdge viewer?

23 of the 26 federal grant-making agencies have completed the Transition to Adobe. The three agencies that have yet to completely transition to Adobe are: National Science Foundation (NSF), United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), and the Department of Energy (DOE). Their transition to Adobe depends on the release of certain agency-specific forms.

2. Does USDOE still use PureEdge or just Adobe?

The Department of Energy (DOE) is in the process of transitioning to Adobe. Their transition to Adobe depends on the release of certain forms. At this time DOE is using PureEdge.

3. I currently have the PureEdge software installed, should I delete it and if not, when?

Currently you may apply for most grant opportunities using Adobe application packages; however until the transition to Adobe is complete, we recommend that you keep PureEdge software. If you are applying for a grant opportunity for an agency other than those referenced in #1 above you will need to download Adobe Reader 8.1.3 from Adobe via the Grants.gov.

ADOBE FORMS

8. Will the Adobe Reader based application packages allow you to easily import PDF information provided from a co-investigator outside your own organization?

Adobe application packages were created with collaboration in mind; however please pay close attention to attachment file names you and your co-investigator add to the packages as well as the version of Adobe Reader used while manipulating the package.

9. When will the the Forms-B versions be ready for download and test? Any update on AT07?

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10. So if an AFGP grant narrative that is originally written in Microsoft Office need to be translated to the Adobe Reader format before being 'cut, copied & pasted' into the online application?

Grants.gov does not recommend copying and pasting information into your Adobe application packages other than plain text; as many characters other than plain text are foreign to the Adobe fillable forms.

Copying and pasting data from a word processor (i.e. MSWord) is not advised as many characters and special formatting is unrecognized by the Adobe software. Data copied and pasted from a word processor may not be translated properly and may cause errors during submission.

If you would like copy and paste text, use a text editor such as Notepad as they use plain text.

11. Is there still the issue of corruption with adobe packages if opened by anyone in the preparation stream who is using adobe 8.1.0 or earlier?

Using a version of Adobe Reader other than the Grants.gov compatible versions may cause errors to occur during submission.

At this time the compatible versions of Adobe Reader are 8.1.1, 8.1.2, **8.1.3** and 9.0. Adobe Reader 8.1.3 is the only version of Adobe Reader known to prevent the "Broken Pipe" error. 12. Is there a problem with creating data with Adobe 9 and submitting the application package using Adobe 8.1.3?

There should not be an issue with using Grants.gov compatible versions of Adobe Reader or Adobe Professional software to open, complete, edit or submit an application package.

Using the same Adobe software version does however limit the possibility of errors occurring during submission. Currently Adobe Reader version 8.1.3 is the only known version which prevents the "Broken Pipe" error. FORMS ISSUES

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13. When I try to print out the Grants.gov application file (before submission- e.g., a draft of the work in progress), When I press print it prints about a dozen or so nearly blank pages with lines and the budget pages are very tiny; Is there any way around this?

14. Why are the Adobe-based application packages crashing? What can we do about it and what is Grants.gov doing about it? The packages are crashing when users are entering data, saving the package...

Answer / Information submitted by viewer:

When they refer to the “Adobe” crashing, on a Mac all it tells you is the “application unexpectedly” and there is nothing you can do if you haven’t saved the document. I have had this happen frequently when moving things from the left to the right to open, but I have also had it happen after inputting info on the 424 form and have tried to save it. I just kept trying and it eventually worked. Hope this helps.

15. Many people using Macs are having problems with the new Adobe forms, even using version 8.1.3. The program crashes frequently, particularly within the Non-modular budget module. Will this be addressed in future builds?

Grants.gov is not aware of any specific issues regarding Macs while submitting in Adobe so please contact the Grants.gov with more specific information on the issue to include screenshots and the Grants.gov PMO will research the issue.

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16. I notice that these new applications take a considerably longer time to maneuver through particularly when shifting forward in the Senior/Key personnel report as well as shifting between budget periods. I've timed these Adobe applications and the forms take over a minute to load these new pages. Is this a software issue on my end? I have updated my Adobe Reader with the newest version found on the Grants.gov site, however I am still running on a Windows XP operating system, is this the issue?

The size of the Adobe application packages vary based on the types of forms and the types of attachments you have added to the package. The larger the application package, the longer it will take to load. The processing speed of your computer also plays a major role in how fast the application and its forms will load and open.

17. After submission of an application why do we receive an html formatted page with the confirmation notice embedded in it, instead of just the confirmation notice that we used to receive?

After submitting an application package you receive a JavaScript screen with a confirmation number for your application package as well as an email confirmation notice. The confirmation email serves as a fail safe in case for some reason you did not have a chance to print the confirmation screen for your records. It is very important to keep the information listed on the confirmation screen and email for your records, as they are used for tracking the status of your submission.

18. One of my co-workers submitted a HRSA Scholarships for Disadvantaged Students application last month, the application materials were on the Adobe forms. Upon submitting the application she received an error email from grants.gov notifying her that the application was not submitted. She resubmitted the application again only to receive the error message again. She contacted the grants.gov helpdesk and was instructed to submit the application a third time, this time the application went through without generating an error. To her shock the two applications that were originally submitted did later go through to the sponsoring agency resulting in 2 duplicate applications. What is the normal procedure we as administrators should follow should we receive a notification from Grants.gov that our applications are not being submitted?

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This issue you have described here “Potential Erroneous Email Notifications” has been reported and is under review to find a solution:

Potential Erroneous Email Notifications

Grants.gov has received notice that some applicants have received conflicting e-mail notifications after a submission. The following scenario has manifested itself more than once;

1. Applicant receives the Grants.gov Submission Receipt e-mail
2. The applicant then receives a Grants.gov Rejection Notice for application with a list of errors
3. This is followed by a Grants.gov Submission Validation Receipt for application e-mail

Applicants are receiving the third validation e-mail without correcting any errors listed in the second Rejection Notice e-mail. Because the Grants.gov system is automatically re-processing the applications, those without errors are being successfully validated, hence the applicant receiving the third Validation Receipt e-mail.

The applications that are re-processed and successfully received into the Grants.gov system are being forwarded to the agencies for retrieval. If the above occurs with your application, we are asking that you engage the [Grants.gov Contact Center](#), secure a case number, follow-up to ensure your application has been received.

The cause of this issue is undetermined at the moment. We are currently researching this issue. We will provide you with more information once we determine the root cause.

REGISTRATION (ORGANIZATION (AOR), INDIVIDUAL)

27. Can an organization have multiple AORs? Does each AOR need their own username and password in order to submit grant applications or should the organization use one username and password to submit applications?

An organization can have multiple AORs, it is up to the organization to grant AOR status to any of its members. Each AOR registers for their own username and password, for use while accessing the system and submitting

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grant applications on behalf of their organization. The username and password is used as an electronic signature.

28. Is it still a requirement for a Corporation to be associated with Academia for submitting proposals to a grant.?

It is not a requirement for a corporation to be associated with academia in order to submit a grant application package. Each grant opportunity lists the eligible applicants. For more information on eligibility visit:

29. What is the time frame on the changes in e-authentication – build 2008 - 03? When would AOR's expect to see this change occur?

30. Can you go over the problems with the Central Contractor Registry again or post the information on your Web site?

31. What does this mean for system to system? Will AOR's experience submission issues upon submitting an application when credentials are being authenticated?

The change to Step 3 of the registration process has no impact on System-to-System (S2S). S2S users utilizes a certificate to submit grant applications.

GRANTS.GOV AGENCY PARTICIPATION

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32. Have you heard about the eGrants system that will be rolled out free of charge in 2010? How will that affect our Grants.gov application process?

Grants.gov is not aware of such a system.

33. Is or does NASA plan to use Grants.gov exclusively for applicants submitting proposals to the agency? If so, when? I realize announcements are posted on Grants.gov, however, we have had to submit packages through the NASA NSPIRES system.

At this time NASA does not have plans to exclusively use Grants.gov for the submission of applications.

34. We submit applications to the Corporation for National and Community Service through eGrants. Will the eGrants process eventually be replaced by Grants.gov for this agency? eGrants is very clunky compared to grants.gov.

Grants.gov is the source for all Federal Agencies to post grant opportunities for the applicant community to search. Several Agencies have their own systems for which applicants can submit grant applications instead of submitting through Grants.gov.
