Civilian control over military operations may become illusory even if only conventional weapons are used under present circumstances. The President's hand may well be forced by the argument that SAC can be longer guarantee the security of its force.

This is why it is essential that the military understand now what the President is prepared to constanance and what he will act agree to. They should be ordered to produce options for a flexible nuclear response even if they do not consider it the optimum strategy.

As order by the Commander-in-Chief will make inter-service debate. It may even be welcomed by many in the Air Force who can then invoke higher authority for doing what they believe to be necessary but what the others of their service inhibit now.
