#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

This report presents results from the 2007 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), an annual census of facilities providing substance abuse treatment. Conducted by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), N-SSATS is designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and use of alcoholism and drug abuse treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. Selected findings are given below.

- The N-SSATS facility response rate in 2007 was 94.5 percent. Thirty-four States or jurisdictions had response rates that equalled or surpassed the overall rate [Tables 1.1 and 6.1].
- A total of 14,359 facilities completed the survey. The 13,648 facilities eligible for this report had a one-day census of 1,135,425 clients enrolled in substance abuse treatment on March 30, 2007 [Tables 1.1 and 3.1].
- There were 85,518 clients under age 18 in treatment on March 30, 2007, making up 8 percent of the total population in treatment on that date [Table 6.4a and 6.4b].

#### **Trends in Facility and Client Characteristics**

- The *facility retention rate* (facilities responding to N-SSATS that had also responded to the previous year's survey) was between 86 and 90 percent in every year from 2003 to 2007. About 10 to 15 percent of the facilities had closed or were no longer providing substance abuse treatment, but were replaced by similar numbers of new facilities [Table 2.1].
- The *total number* of substance abuse treatment facilities remained relatively constant between 2003 and 2007, while the number of clients in treatment increased slightly. There were 13,623 facilities reporting in 2003 and 13,648 facilities in 2007. The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date increased by 4 percent, from 1,092,546 in 2003 to 1,135,425 in 2007 [Tables 2.2 and 3.1].
- The *operational structure* of the substance abuse treatment system changed very little from 2003 to 2007. Private non-profit organizations operated 61 percent of all facilities in 2003 and decreased slightly but steadily to 58 percent in 2007. However, the proportion of clients in private non-profit facilities remained at 55 to 56 percent of all clients during that period. Private for-profit organizations operated 25 percent of all facilities in 2003, increasing slightly but steadily to 29 percent in 2007. The proportion of clients in private for-profit facilities also increased, from 26 percent in 2003 to 30 percent in 2007. Government-operated facilities maintained stable proportions of both facilities and clients between 2003 and 2007 [Tables 2.2 and 3.1 and Figures 1 and 5].
- The primary focus of activity of facilities changed slightly from 2003 to 2007. Facilities whose primary
  focus was the provision of substance abuse treatment services made up 61 to 62 percent of all facilities
  between 2003 and 2007, and treated 68 to 69 percent of all clients. Facilities providing a mix of mental

health and substance abuse treatment services increased slightly as a percentage of all facilities, from 26 percent in 2003 to 29 percent in 2007; the proportion of clients treated in these facilities also increased slightly, from 23 percent in 2003 to 26 percent in 2007. Facilities whose primary focus was the provision of mental health services made up 7 to 8 percent of all facilities and treated 4 to 5 percent of all clients. Facilities whose primary focus was general health care made up only 1 to 2 percent of all facilities and treated only 1 or 2 percent of all clients [Tables 2.2 and 3.1 and Figure 2].

- The *major types of care*—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—were stable between 2003 and 2007 in terms of the proportions of both facilities and clients in treatment. Outpatient treatment was provided by 80 to 81 percent of all facilities from 2003 to 2007, and 89 to 90 percent of all clients received outpatient care. Residential (non-hospital) treatment was provided by 27 to 28 percent of all facilities, and 9 to 10 percent of all clients received this type of care. Hospital inpatient treatment was provided by 7 to 9 percent of all facilities, and 1 percent of all clients received this type of care [Tables 2.3 and 3.2 and Figures 3 and 6].
- Opioid Treatment Programs certified by SAMHSA for the provision of therapy with methadone and buprenorphine were provided by 8 to 9 percent of all facilities between 2003 and 2007. The proportion of clients receiving methadone ranged from 21 percent to 23 percent in that period [Tables 2.3 and 3.2 and Figures 3 and 6].
- Agreements or contracts with managed care organizations were reported by 51 percent of all facilities in 2003; this proportion fell to 47 percent in 2007. Similarly, the proportion of clients in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts fell from 52 percent of all clients in 2003 to 48 percent in 2007 [Tables 2.4 and 3.4 and Figures 4 and 7].
- The *client substance abuse problem treated* fluctuated slightly between 2003 and 2007. Clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse made up 45 to 47 percent of all clients from 2003 to 2007. Clients in treatment for drug abuse only increased slightly but steadily, from 33 percent in 2003 to 36 percent in 2007. The proportion of clients treated for alcohol abuse ranged from 18 to 20 percent between 2003 and 2007 [Table 3.3].
- Clients under age 18 made up 8 percent of all clients in treatment in every year from 2003 through 2007. The type of care received by clients under age 18 differed little from that received by adults, and was stable between 2003 and 2007. Outpatient care was received by 87 to 88 percent, residential (non-hospital) care by 11 to 12 percent, and hospital inpatient care by 1 percent. The proportion of clients under age 18 in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents ranged from 82 to 85 percent between 2003 and 2007 [Tables 3.5, 6.3b, and Figure 8].

#### **Facility Operation**

• Private non-profit organizations operated 58 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and were treating 55 percent of all clients. Private for-profit organizations operated 29 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and were treating 30 percent of all clients. Local governments operated 6 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and were treating 8 percent of all clients, State governments operated 3 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and were treating 4 percent of all clients. The Federal government operated 2 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and was treating 3 percent of all clients. Tribal governments operated 1 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and were treating 1 percent of all clients [Tables 4.1 and 5.1].

#### **Primary Focus**

• The provision of substance abuse treatment services was the primary focus of activity of 61 percent of facilities on March 30, 2007, with 68 percent of all clients in treatment. A mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services was the primary focus of 29 percent of facilities on March 30, 2007, with 26 percent of all clients in treatment. The provision of mental health services was the primary focus of 7 percent of facilities on March 30, 2007, with 4 percent of all clients in treatment. General health care was the primary focus of 1 percent of facilities on March 30, 2007, with 1 percent of all clients in treatment [Tables 4.1 and 5.1].

#### **Type of Care**

- Outpatient treatment was offered by 81 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and reported 1,016,913 clients (90 percent of all clients) in treatment on that date. On March 30, 2007:
  - Regular outpatient care was offered by 74 percent of facilities and had 52 percent of clients.
  - Intensive outpatient care was offered by 44 percent of facilities and had 12 percent of clients.
  - Outpatient day treatment/partial hospitalization was offered by 15 percent of facilities and had 2 percent of clients.
  - Outpatient detoxification was offered by 11 percent of facilities and had 1 percent of clients.
  - Outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance was offered by 10 percent of facilities and had 22 percent of clients [Tables 4.2b, 5.2a, and 5.2b].
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment was offered by 27 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and reported 103,709 clients (9 percent of all clients) in treatment on that date. On March 30, 2007:
  - Residential (non-hospital) long-term treatment was offered by 22 percent of facilities and had 6 percent of clients.
  - Residential (non-hospital) short-term treatment was offered by 13 percent of facilities and had 2 percent of clients.
  - Residential (non-hospital) detoxification was offered by 7 percent of facilities and had less than 1 percent of clients [Tables 4.2b, 5.2a, and 5.2b].
- Hospital inpatient treatment was offered by 7 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007, and reported 14,803 clients (1 percent of all clients) in treatment on that date. On March 30, 2007:
  - Hospital inpatient detoxification was offered by 6 percent of facilities and had less than 1 percent of clients.
  - Hospital inpatient treatment was offered by 5 percent of facilities and had less than 1 percent of clients [Tables 4.2b, 5.2a, and 5.2b].

#### Client Substance Abuse Problem and Co-occurring Mental Health Disorders

• On March 30, 2007, 45 percent of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, 36 percent were in treatment for drug abuse only, and 19 percent were in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone [Tables 4.3 and 5.3].

- Eighty-seven percent of facilities had clients in treatment for co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders. Forty percent of all clients were in treatment for these disorders [Tables 4.3 and 5.3].
- In the United States, there were 459 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and older on March 30, 2007. The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug problems (203 per 100,000 population aged 18 and older), followed by drug abuse only (170 per 100,000), and alcohol abuse only (86 per 100,000) [Table 6.33].

#### **Facility Size**

- The median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility on March 30, 2007, was 42 [Table 4.4].
- Facility size varied by type of care offered. In facilities offering outpatient care, the median number of clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, was 48. By type of outpatient care, however, the median ranged from 1 client in outpatient detoxification to 30 clients in regular outpatient care and to 132 clients receiving outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance. In facilities offering residential (non-hospital) care, the median number of clients was 18, and in hospital inpatient facilities, it was 9 [Table 4.4].
- Facilities whose focus was the provision of mental health services tended to be smaller than facilities whose focus was the provision of substance abuse treatment [Table 4.5].

#### **Facility Capacity and Utilization Rates**

- On March 30, 2007, 92 percent of all residential (non-hospital) beds and 84 percent of all hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use [Tables 4.6 and 4.7].
- Facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds had generally higher utilization rates than facilities with hospital inpatient beds. Sixty percent of facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds had utilization rates of 91 to 100 percent or more, while 43 percent of facilities with hospital inpatient beds had utilization rates in that range [Tables 4.6 and 4.7].

#### **Services Provided**

- Screening for substance abuse, comprehensive substance abuse assessment or diagnosis, individual counseling, group counseling, drug or alcohol urine screening, discharge planning, aftercare/continuing care, substance abuse education, and case management were each provided by 75 percent or more of all facilities [Tables 4.8 and 4.9].
- Screening for mental health disorders; family counseling; breathalyzer or other blood alcohol testing; social skills development; HIV or AIDS education, counseling, or support; mental health services; and assistance with obtaining social services were each provided by between 50 and 74 percent of all facilities [Tables 4.8 and 4.9].

#### Clinical/Therapeutic Approaches

• Substance abuse counseling and relapse prevention were used often by almost all facilities (96 percent and 91 percent, respectively). Cognitive-behavioral therapy, a 12-step approach, anger management, motivational interviewing, and brief intervention were each used sometimes or often by 80 to 90 percent of all facilities. Trauma-related counseling was used sometimes or often by 65 percent, and contingency management by 50 percent [Table 4.10].

#### **Programs or Groups for Specific Client Types**

• Overall, 82 percent of facilities offered programs or groups designed to address the specific needs of specific client types. Special programs or groups for clients with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders were provided by 37 percent of facilities, for adult women by 32 percent, for adolescents and DUI/DWI offenders by 31 percent each, for criminal justice clients by 27 percent, and for adult men by 25 percent. Less frequently offered were programs or groups for pregnant or postpartum women (14 percent), persons with HIV or AIDS (10 percent), seniors or older adults (7 percent), and gays or lesbians (6 percent) [Table 4.11b].

#### Services in Sign Language and in Languages Other than English

- Substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired were offered in 30 percent of all facilities [Table 4.12b].
- Of the facilities offering substance abuse treatment services in a language other than English, 42 percent reported that the services were provided by staff counselors only, 38 percent by on-call interpreters, and 20 percent by both staff counselors and on-call interpreters [Table 4.12b].
- Spanish was the most commonly reported language among facilities using staff counselors to provide
  treatment services in languages other than English. It was reported by 91 percent of these facilities.
  American Indian/Alaska Native languages were offered in 4 percent of these facilities overall and in 90
  percent of those operated by tribal governments and in 73 percent of those operated by the Indian Health
  Service [Table 4.12b].

#### **Client Detoxification Substances**

Opiate detoxification was provided by 93 percent of all facilities that provided detoxification services, alcohol detoxification by 78 percent, cocaine detoxification by 64 percent, and detoxification from other substances by 39 percent. Medications were routinely used as part of the detoxification process in 84 percent of the facilities offering detoxification services [Table 4.13].

#### **Client Outreach**

- A hot-line responding to substance abuse problems was operated by 22 percent of all facilities [Table 4.14].
- Web sites providing information about a facility's substance abuse treatment programs were maintained by 65 percent of all facilities [Table 4.14].

#### Facility Licensing, Certification, or Accreditation

- Ninety-five percent of all facilities reported that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by one or
  more agencies or organizations. The State substance abuse agency licensed, certified, or accredited 81
  percent of facilities; the State public health department/board of health, 41 percent; and the State mental
  health department, 34 percent. JCAHO and CARF were cited as accrediting organizations by 21 percent
  and 20 percent of all facilities [Table 4.15b].
- Facility licensing, certification, or accreditation was associated with the type of care offered. The State
  substance abuse agency licensed, certified, or accredited 82 percent each of facilities offering outpatient
  treatment and residential (non-hospital) treatment, but only 60 percent of facilities offering hospital
  inpatient treatment. Conversely, the State mental health department, licensed, certified, or accredited

46 percent of hospital inpatient facilities but only 36 percent of outpatient facilities and 26 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities [Table 4.16b].

#### **Standard Operating Procedures**

• Almost all the practices listed were used as standard operating procedures by 80 percent or more of all facilities. Continuing education for staff was required by 95 percent of all facilities, supervisor case review by 93 percent, client satisfaction surveys by 89 percent, client drug testing by 83 percent, and utilization reviews by 81 percent [Table 4.17b].

#### **Payment Options**

- A sliding fee scale for substance abuse treatment charges was used by 62 percent of all facilities. More than half of all facilities accepted cash or self-payment (60 percent), Medicare (54 percent), or private health insurance (52 percent), and 52 percent offered treatment at no charge to eligible clients who could not pay [Table 4.18b].
- Access to Recovery (ATR) vouchers were accepted by between 11 percent and 63 percent of all facilities in the 14 States in which they were available [Table 6.20b].

#### **Facility Funding**

• Sixty percent of all facilities received Federal, State, or local government funds for the provision of substance abuse treatment services. Government-operated and private non-profit organizations were more likely to receive these funds than were private for-profit facilities (between 70 percent and 86 percent, compared to 22 percent for private for-profit organizations) [Table 4.19].

#### **Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs)**

- Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) were available at 8 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities on March 30, 2007, and clients receiving methadone or buprenorphine accounted for 23 percent of all clients in treatment [Tables 2.3 and 3.2].
- Fifty percent of OTPs were operated by private for-profit organizations, compared to 29 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities [Tables 4.1 and 4.20].
- Facilities with OTPs were likely to be dedicated almost entirely to medication-assisted therapy (treatment including methadone or buprenorphine). Overall, 89 percent of clients in facilities with OTPs on March 30, 2007, were receiving methadone or buprenorphine [Table 4.20].
- Most facilities with OTPs offered outpatient treatment (93 percent). Outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance was offered in 90 percent, regular outpatient treatment in 62 percent, detoxification in 51 percent, intensive outpatient treatment in 27 percent, and day treat/partial hospitalization in 9 percent. Residential (non-hospital) treatment was offered by 9 percent, and hospital inpatient treatment were offered by 10 percent of facilities with OTPs [Table 4.21].
- Of the 265,716 clients receiving one of the two medications approved for the treatment of opioid addiction, 99 percent received methadone and only 3,032 (1 percent) received buprenorphine [Table 4.20].

#### CHAPTER 1

# DESCRIPTION OF THE NATIONAL SURVEY OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES (N-SSATS)

This report presents tabular information and highlights from the 2007 National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS), conducted between March and October 2007, with a reference date of March 30, 2007. It is the 30th in a series of national surveys begun in the 1970s. The surveys were designed to collect data on the location, characteristics, and utilization of alcohol and drug treatment facilities and services throughout the 50 States, the District of Columbia, and other U.S. jurisdictions. The Office of Applied Studies, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, plans and directs N-SSATS.

N-SSATS is designed to collect information from all facilities<sup>2</sup> in the United States, both public and private, that provide substance abuse treatment. (Additional information on N-SSATS, its history, and changes in the survey and survey universe over time is provided in Appendix A.)

N-SSATS provides the mechanism for quantifying the dynamic character and composition of the U.S. substance abuse treatment delivery system. The objectives of N-SSATS are to collect multipurpose data that can be used to —

Assist SAMHSA and State and local governments in assessing the nature and extent of services provided in State-supported and

- other substance abuse treatment facilities and in forecasting substance abuse treatment resource requirements;
- Update SAMHSA's Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), which includes all known drug and alcohol abuse treatment facilities (see Appendix A);
- Analyze substance abuse treatment services trends and conduct comparative analyses for the nation, regions, and States;
- Generate the National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs, a compendium of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment; and
- Update the information in SAMHSA's Substance Abuse Treatment Facility Locator, a searchable database of facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies for the provision of substance abuse treatment. The Treatment Facility Locator is available on the Internet at:

In this report, entities responding to N-SSATS are referred to as "facilities." As discussed later in the report, a "facility" may be a program-level, clinic-level, or multi-site respondent.

## **Data Collection Procedures for the 2007 N-SSATS**

Field period and reference date

The field period for the 2007 N-SSATS ran from March 30, 2007, through October 17, 2007, with a reference date of March 30, 2007.

#### Survey coverage

The 2007 N-SSATS facility universe included all 16,146 active treatment facilities on SAMHSA's I-SATS at a point 6 weeks before the survey reference date. There were 627 facilities added by State substance abuse agencies or discovered during the first 3 weeks of the survey that were also included in the survey universe, increasing the total survey universe to 16,773.

#### Content

The 2007 N-SSATS survey instrument was a 12-page document with 47 numbered questions. (See Appendix B.) Topics included:

- Facility identification information
- Facility operation (private for-profit; private non-profit; government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; tribal)
- Facility focus (substance abuse treatment, mental health, mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services; general health care; other)
- Type of care provided
  - Outpatient treatment services (regular outpatient treatment, intensive outpatient treatment, day treatment or partial hospitalization, detoxification, methadone/buprenorphine maintenance)
  - Residential (non-hospital) treatment services (long-term—more than 30 days, short-term—30 days or fewer, detoxification)

- Hospital treatment services (inpatient treatment, inpatient detoxification)
- Provision of treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse, alcohol abuse only, drug abuse only, co-occurring mental health disorders
- Services offered (assessment and pre-treatment services, counseling, pharmacotherapies, testing, transitional services, ancillary services)
- Clinical/therapeutic approaches (substance abuse counseling, 12-step approach, brief intervention, cognitive-behavioral therapy, contingency management, motivational interviewing, trauma-related counseling, anger management, relapse prevention, other)
- Special programs or groups provided for specific client types (adolescents, clients with co-occurring mental and substance abuse disorders, persons with HIV or AIDS, gays or lesbians, seniors or older adults, adult women, pregnant or postpartum women, adult men, DUI/DWI offenders, other criminal justice clients, other)
- Services provided in alternate languages (sign language for the hearing impaired, languages other than English)
- Detoxification from alcohol, opiates, cocaine, or other drugs, and routine use of medication during detoxification
- Client outreach (hot-line operation, maintenance of web site)
- Licensure, certification, or accreditation (State substance abuse agency, mental health department, or department of health; hospital licensing authority; JCAHO; CARF; NCQA; COA; other State or local agency or organization)
- Standard operating procedures (continuing staff education, client drug testing, supervisor case review, case review by a quality

review committee, post-discharge outcome follow-up, utilization review, client satisfaction survey)

- Payment options (sliding fee scale, treatment at no charge, cash or self-payment, Medicare, Medicaid, State-financed health insurance, Federal military insurance, private health insurance, Access to Recovery (ATR) vouchers, other)
- Facility funding (public funding; agreements or contracts with managed care organizations)
- Operation of an Opioid Treatment Program (OTP) certified by SAMHSA and offering maintenance and/or detoxification with methadone and/or buprenorphine
- Clients in treatment on March 30, 2007 (total, clients under age 18, clients receiving methadone and buprenorphine)
- Annual admissions and number funded by ATR vouchers
- Percent of clients treated for abuse of both alcohol and drugs, alcohol abuse only, drug abuse only
- Percent of clients with co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders
- Percent of clients receiving counseling (individual, group, family, marital/couples)
- Number of beds designated for residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient substance abuse treatment

#### Data collection

Six weeks before the survey, letters were mailed to all facilities to alert them to expect the survey. An additional purpose of the letters was to update records with new address information received from the Post Office. On the survey reference date, data collection packets, including the questionnaire, SAMHSA cover letter,

State-specific letter of endorsement, information on completing the survey on the Internet, and a sheet of Frequently Asked Questions, were mailed to each facility. During the data collection phase, contract personnel were available to answer facilities' questions concerning the survey. Support in responding to questions for those facilities completing the questionnaire over the Internet was also available. Four to 5 weeks after the initial questionnaire mailing, thank you/reminder letters were sent to all facilities. Approximately 8 weeks after the initial questionnaire mailing, nonresponding facilities were sent a second questionnaire mailing. About 4 to 5 weeks after the second questionnaire mailing, non-respondents received a reminder telephone call. Those facilities that had not responded within 2 to 3 weeks of the reminder call were telephoned and asked to complete the survey by telephone. The overall response rate was 94.5 percent.

#### Forms accounting and response rate

Table 1.1 presents a summary of response rate information. Questionnaires were mailed to a total of 16,773 facilities believed to be actively providing substance abuse treatment services. Of these facilities, 9.4 percent were found to be ineligible for the survey because they had closed or did not provide substance abuse treatment or detoxification on March 30, 2007. Of the remaining 15,188 facilities, 94.5 percent completed the survey.

#### Exclusions from the 2007 N-SSATS Report

The N-SSATS survey serves several purposes, as noted earlier, and 408 of the 14,359 survey respondents provided information but were deemed out of the scope of this report. They were excluded from the analyses presented here. The excluded facilities and reasons for exclusion fell into three categories:

• 188 facilities were halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment.

These facilities were included in the survey so that they could be listed in the Directory and on the Treatment Facility Locator.

- 150 facilities were solo practitioners.
   I-SATS and N-SSATS are designed to include facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed and surveyed only if the State substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they are included. The excluded solo practitioners had not been identified for inclusion by the State substance abuse agency.
- 70 facilities were jails, prisons, or other organizations that treated incarcerated clients exclusively.

An additional 303 facilities whose client counts were included in or "rolled into" other facilities' counts and whose facility characteristics were not reported separately were excluded from facility counts in this report. However, their client counts are included.

After the exclusion of 408 out-of-scope facilities and 303 rolled-up facilities, 13,648 eligible respondent facilities were included in the 2007 N-SSATS report.

Number of respondents reporting facility and client data

*Table 1.2.* There were 13,648 eligible respondents to the 2007 N-SSATS. The breakdown of facility data and client counts reported by these respondents is summarized below.

- 11,890 facilities reported facility data and client counts for their own organizations.
- 665 facilities reported facility characteristics for themselves and provided client counts for their own facility and for other facilities. These 665 facilities reported client counts for 1,326 facilities, including themselves.
- 1,093 facilities reported facility characteristics only. Their client counts were reported by another facility.

#### Quality assurance

All mail questionnaires were reviewed manually for consistency and for missing data. After data entry, automated quality assurance reviews were conducted. These incorporated the rules used in manual editing, plus consistency checks and checks for data outliers not readily implemented by manual review. Calls were made to facilities to clarify questionable responses and to obtain missing data.

If facilities could not be reached during the edit callbacks, responses that were clearly in error were replaced by imputation.

The Internet questionnaire was programmed to be self-editing; that is, respondents were prompted to complete missing responses and to confirm or correct inconsistent responses.

#### Item non-response

Careful editing and extensive follow-up have minimized item non-response. (See Appendix C.) Item non-response was generally low, averaging 3 percent across all items. It was 10 percent or more for only 13 items.

Missing data for client count variables (i.e., the number of clients in hospital inpatient, residential (non-hospital), and outpatient treatment, and their subcategories) were imputed, as were total annual admissions. Facilities with missing values for non-imputed variables were excluded from the tabulations using those variables. As a result, the numbers of treatment facilities on which tables are based may vary somewhat from table to table. The total number of facilities is generally included on each table.

# Methodology of Imputation of Missing Data and Outliers

As noted above, client count variables (i.e., the number of clients in the different service types) and total annual admissions were candidates for imputation.

A total of 92 facilities were missing one-day client census counts for one or more types of service. An imputed value for a type of service was given if a facility reported that it provided the service but had not provided a client count for the service. For example, if a facility reported that it provided hospital inpatient and outpatient services, but not residential (non-hospital) services, client values were imputed for the hospital inpatient and outpatient counts only.

Outliers were identified as cases where the number of clients reported exceeded the 75th percentile of the distribution of client counts for all cases of one of the main service types. The 2007 value was compared with the average of previous years' data. If the difference exceeded 1.8 times the 2007 value in either direction, the value was imputed.

When available, client values from the 2006 N-SSATS were used to impute the missing client

counts on the 2007 N-SSATS. In all other cases, the average client value, stratified by State and facility operation, was used to impute the missing client counts. If a facility were unique in its State and facility operation category, values were imputed using average values for the State only. Missing client counts were imputed for each type of service (i.e., hospital inpatient detoxification, hospital inpatient treatment, residential (non-hospital) detoxification, etc.) and summed to the larger service type totals (total hospital inpatient clients, total residential (non-hospital) clients, and total outpatient clients), and finally to total clients.

# **Further Data Considerations and Limitations**

As with any data collection effort, certain procedural considerations and data limitations must be taken into account when interpreting data from the 2007 N-SSATS. Some general issues are listed below; other considerations are detailed in Appendix A. Considerations and limitations of specific data items are discussed where the data are presented.

- N-SSATS attempts to obtain responses from all known treatment facilities, but it is a voluntary survey. There is no adjustment for the 5.5 percent facility non-response.
- N-SSATS is a point-prevalence survey. It provides information on the substance abuse treatment system and its clients on the reference date. Client counts reported here do not represent annual totals. Rather, N-SSATS provides a "snapshot" of substance abuse treatment facilities and clients on an average day.
- Multiple responses were allowed for certain variables (e.g., services provided and specialized programs). Tabulations of these variables include the total number of facilities reporting each response.

#### **Organization of the Report**

The balance of this report is organized into five sections. Chapter 2 presents trends in facility characteristics for 2003 to 2007. Chapter 3 presents trends in client characteristics for 2003 to 2007. Chapter 4 describes key characteristics of facilities and the programs and services they provide. Chapter 5 describes key characteristics of clients in substance abuse treatment on March 30, 2007. Finally, Chapter 6 presents State-level detail for most of the tables presented in Chapters 4 and 5. Appendix A provides additional information on N-SSATS, its history, and changes in the survey and survey universe over time. Appendix B contains the 2007 N-SSATS mail survey. Appendix C contains a table of item response rates.

#### **Terminology**

The majority of tables in the report are organized by facility operation and by primary focus of the facility. Therefore, it is important to define these terms.

Facility operation indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit; private non-profit; or government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; or tribal.

*Primary focus* indicates the services the facility primarily provides: substance abuse treatment services; mental health services; a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services; general health care; or other.

Clients in treatment were defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential (non-hospital) clients receiving substance abuse services at the facility on March 30, 2007; and 2) outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detoxification service at least once during the month of March 2007, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 30, 2007.

#### CHAPTER 2

#### TRENDS IN FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS


This chapter presents trends in facility characteristics for 2003 to 2007.


#### **Number of Facilities**

Table 2.1. The total number of substance abuse treatment facilities remained relatively constant between 2003 and 2007, although there was considerable turnover from year to year in the individual facilities responding to the survey. Every year, between 86 and 90 percent of the facilities responding to a given survey had also responded to the previous year's survey. About 10 to 15 percent of the facilities had closed or

were no longer providing substance abuse treatment, but were replaced by similar numbers of new facilities.

The total number of facilities fell from 13,771 in 2006 to 13,648 in 2007, difference of only 123 facilities (1 percent). Of the 13,638 2007 facilities, 12,226 (90 percent) responded to both the 2006 and 2007 surveys and 1,422 (10 percent) were new to the 2007 survey. Of the 13,771 2006 facilities, 1,545 (11 percent) had closed or were no longer providing substance abuse treatment in 2007.





Despite the year-to-year changes in the facilities reporting, several core structural characteristics of the substance abuse treatment system remained stable from 2003 to 2007.

#### **Facility Operation**

Table 2.2 and Figure 1. Facilities are described in terms of operation, that is, the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private non-profit; private for-profit; or government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; or tribal.


The operational structure of the substance abuse treatment system changed slightly from 2003 to 2007. Private non-profit organizations operated 61 percent of all facilities in 2003 and decreased slightly but steadily to 58 percent in 2007. Private for-profit organizations operated 25 percent

of all facilities in 2003, increasing slightly but steadily to 29 percent in 2007. Government-operated facilities maintained stable proportions of both facilities and clients between 2003 and 2007. Local governments operated 6 to 7 percent of all facilities; State governments, 3 percent; the Federal government, 2 percent; and tribal governments, 1 percent.

#### **Primary Focus of Facility**

Table 2.2 and Figure 2. Facilities are also described according to the primary focus of activity of the facility, i.e., the services the facility primarily provides: substance abuse treatment services; mental health services; a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services; general health care; or other.

The primary focus of activity of facilities changed very little from 2003 to 2007. Facili-

ties whose primary focus was the provision of substance abuse treatment services made up 61 to 62 percent of all facilities between 2003 and 2007. Facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services increased slightly as a percentage of all facilities, from 26 percent in 2003 and 2004 to 29 percent in 2007. Facilities whose primary focus was the provision of mental health services made up 7 to 8 percent of all facilities between 2003 and 2007, and facilities whose primary focus of activity was general health care made up only 1 to 2 percent of all facilities.

#### Type of Care Offered

*Table 2.3 and Figure 3.* The proportion of facilities offering the major types of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—were stable between 2003 and 2007.

Outpatient treatment was provided by 80 to 81 percent of all facilities from 2003 to 2007. Residential (non-hospital) treatment was provided by 27 to 28 percent of all facilities. Hospital inpatient treatment was provided by 7 to 8 percent of all facilities.<sup>1</sup>

#### **Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs**

Table 2.3 and Figure 3. Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs), certified by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, provide medication-assisted therapy with methadone and buprenorphine, the only two opioid medications approved for the treatment of opioid addiction. OTPs were provided by 8 to 9 percent of all facilities between 2003 and 2007.



#### **Managed Care**

Table 2.4 and Figure 4. In general, the term "managed care" refers to the prepaid health care sector where care is provided under a fixed budget within which costs are "managed."

Agreements or contracts with managed care organizations were reported by 51 percent of all facilities in 2003; this proportion fell to 46 percent in 2007. In 2003, more than half of both private non-profit and private for-profit facilities had managed care agreements or contracts (54 percent and 53 percent, respectively). These proportions fell steadily to 49 percent and 48 percent, respectively, in 2007.

In local, State, and Federal government-operated facilities, the proportions with managed care agreements or contracts fell from 2003 to 2005, but by 2007 had rebounded to levels near

those seen in 2003. Facilities operated by tribal governments displayed a different pattern; the proportion with managed care agreements or contracts increased from 21 percent in 2003 to 30 percent in 2006, but fell to 23 percent in 2007.

Facilities with Managed Care Agreements or Contracts, by Facility Operation: 2003-2007



## CHAPTER 3

# TRENDS IN CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS


This chapter presents trends in client characteristics for 2003 to 2007.

*Table 3.1.* The number of clients in treatment on the survey reference date increased by only 4 percent from 2003 to 2007, from 1,092,546 in 2003 to 1,135,425 in 2007.

# **Facility Operation**

Table 3.1 and Figure 5. In almost all categories of facility operation, the proportions of clients in treatment were relatively stable between 2003

and 2007. Private non-profit facilities treated 55 to 56 percent of all clients during that period. In private for-profit facilities, however, the proportion of clients in treatment increased from 26 percent in 2003 to 30 percent in 2007. (The number of clients in private for-profit facilities increased by 20 percent, from 282,161 in 2003 to 338,031 in 2007. This was largely offset by 16 and 8 percent decreases in the numbers of clients in local and State government-operated facilities, respectively.) Government-operated facilities maintained stable proportions of both

facilities and clients between 2003 and 2007. Local government-operated facilities treated 8 to 9 percent of all clients during that period, State government-operated facilities treated 4 percent, Federal government-operated facilities treated 3 percent, and tribal government-operated facilities treated 1 percent.

## **Primary Focus of Facility**

Table 3.1. In almost all categories of facility primary focus of activity, the proportions of clients in treatment changed very little from 2003 to 2007. Facilities whose primary focus was the provision of substance abuse treatment services treated 68 to 69 percent of all clients between 2003 and 2007. In facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, the proportion of clients treated in these facilities increased slightly, from 23 percent in 2003 to 26 percent in 2007. Facili-

ties whose primary focus was the provision of mental health services treated 4 to 5 percent of all clients. Facilities whose primary focus was general health care treated only 1 or 2 percent of all clients

## **Type of Care Received**

Table 3.2 and Figure 6. The proportions of clients in treatment for the major types of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), and hospital inpatient—were stable between 2003 and 2007. Clients in outpatient treatment made up 89 to 90 percent of all clients between 2003 and 2007. The proportion of clients in residential (non-hospital) treatment was between 9 and 10 percent from 2003 to 2007, and about 1 percent of all clients were in hospital inpatient treatment.



# Clients Receiving Methadone or Buprenorphine

Table 3.2 and Figure 6. Clients receiving methadone or buprenorphine could be in any of the three major types of care—outpatient, residential (non-hospital), or hospital inpatient. Questions asking for the number of clients in treatment receiving buprenorphine were added to the N-SSATS in 2004.

The proportion of all clients receiving methadone increased slightly between 2003 and 2007, from 21 percent to 23 percent. The proportion of clients receiving buprenorphine was less than 1 percent in every year from 2004 to 2007.

#### **Substance Abuse Problem Treated**

Table 3.3. The client substance abuse problem treated fluctuated slightly between 2003 and 2007. Clients in treatment for both drug and alcohol abuse made up 45 to 47 percent of all clients from 2003 to 2007. Clients in treatment for drug abuse only increased slightly but steadily, from 33 percent in 2003 to 36 percent in 2007. The proportion of clients treated for alcohol abuse ranged from 18 to 20 percent between 2003 and 2007.

# **Managed Care**

Table 3.4 and Figure 7. In general, the term "managed care" refers to the prepaid health care sector where care is provided under a fixed budget within which costs are "managed."

The proportion of clients in facilities with



agreements or contracts with managed care organizations fluctuated between 2003 and 2007. However, in 2003, more than half (52 percent) of all clients were in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts; by 2007, this proportion had fallen to 48 percent. The proportions of all clients in these facilities fell between 2003 and 2007 in private non-profit facilities (from 59 to 55 percent), State government-operated facilities (from 45 to 39 percent), and in tribal government-operated facilities (from 34 to 19 percent). The proportions of all clients in facilities with managed care agreements or contracts was about the same in 2003 and 2007 in private for-profit facilities (46 and 44 percent), local government-operated facilities (41 percent in both years), and in Federal government-operated facilities (16 and 17 percent).

# Clients under Age 18 in Treatment

*Table 3.5 and Figure 8.* Clients under age 18 made up 8 percent of all clients in every year from 2003 through 2007 [Table 6.3b].

The types of care received by clients under age 18 were also stable between 2003 and 2007. Eighty-seven to 88 percent were in outpatient treatment, 11 to 12 percent were in residential (non-hospital) treatment, and 1 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment.

The proportion of clients under age 18 in treatment facilities with special programs or groups for adolescents ranged from 82 to 85 percent between 2003 and 2007.

Offering Special Programs or Groups for Adolescents: 2003-2007



## CHAPTER 4

## FACILITY CHARACTERISTICS AND SERVICES

This chapter describes key characteristics of facilities and programs in 2007. Facilities are described in terms of operation, that is, the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private non-profit; private for-profit; or government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; or tribal. They are also described in terms of the facility's primary focus of activity: substance abuse treatment services; mental health services; a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services; general health care; and other.

#### **Facility Operation and Primary Focus**

Table 4.1. Private non-profit organizations operated 58 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007. On that date, private for-profit organizations operated 29 percent of all facilities, local governments operated 6 percent, State governments operated 3 percent; the Federal government operated 2 percent, and tribal governments operated 1 percent of all facilities.

The provision of substance abuse treatment services was the focus of activity of 61 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007. A mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services was the focus of 29 percent of all facilities on that date; the provision of mental health services, 7 percent; and general health care, 1 percent.

These proportions were fairly constant for each operational type within a specific focus of activity, and vice versa. One notable exception was the relationship between facilities operated by the Federal government operation and those providing general health care. Twenty-nine percent of facilities focused on providing general health

care were operated by the Federal government, and only 8 percent by private for-profit organizations. Conversely, 17 percent of facilities operated by the Federal government provided general health care. This association was largely because of facilities operated by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). Of the 328 facilities operated by the Federal government, 183 (56 percent) were operated by the VA and were generally hospital-based.<sup>1</sup>

# **Type of Care Offered**

Tables 4.2a and 4.2b. Type of care offered is made up of three broad categories—outpatient treatment, residential (non-hospital) treatment, and hospital inpatient treatment. Each has several subcategories. A facility could offer more than one type of care.

Outpatient treatment was offered by 81 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007. Regular outpatient care was offered by 74 percent of all facilities on that date, intensive outpatient treatment by 44 percent, outpatient day treatment/partial hospitalization by 15 percent, outpatient detoxification by 11 percent, and outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance by 10 percent.

Outpatient treatment was offered in the majority of facilities in each of the operational categories (from 71 percent of State government-operated facilities to 98 percent of Federal governmentoperated facilities). It was also offered in the

Of the 183 facilities operated by the VA, 162 (89 percent) reported that they were located in or operated by a hospital [data not shown].

majority of each of the foci of activity (from 77 percent of facilities providing substance abuse treatment to 89 percent each of facilities providing a mix of mental heath and substance abuse treatment services and those providing mental health services.

Outpatient detoxification and outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance were offered by relatively high proportions of Federal government-operated facilities (36 and 24 percent, respectively), driven by high proportions of VA-operated facilities (45 and 41 percent, respectively). Outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance was also offered by a relatively high proportion of private for-profit facilities (17 percent).

Residential (non-hospital) treatment was offered by 27 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007. Long-term treatment (more than 30 days) was offered by 22 percent of all facilities on that date, short-term care (30 days or fewer) by 13 percent, and detoxification by 7 percent.

Residential (non-hospital) treatment availability varied widely by facility operation (from 14 percent of private for-profit facilities to 35 percent of private non-profit facilities), and by facility focus of activity (from 9 percent of facilities providing mental health services to 34 percent of facilities providing substance abuse treatment services).

Hospital inpatient treatment was offered by 7 percent of all facilities on March 30, 2007. Detoxification was offered by 6 percent of all facilities on that date, and treatment by 5 percent.

Hospital inpatient treatment availability varied widely by facility operation. It was 27 percent in Federal government-operated facilities, but otherwise ranged from 3 to 13 percent. Availability also varied with facility focus of activity. It was 40 percent in facilities providing general

health care, but otherwise ranged from 5 to 18 percent.

# **Client Substance Abuse Problem and Co-occurring Mental Health Disorders**

Table 4.3. Almost all facilities (91 percent) had clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse on March 30, 2007. Seventy-nine percent had clients in treatment for abuse of drugs alone, and 78 percent for abuse of alcohol alone. Most facilities (87 percent) also had clients in treatment with co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders. These proportions were relatively constant across facility operation categories and by the primary focus of the facility.

# **Facility Size**

Table 4.4. The median number of clients in substance abuse treatment at a facility on March 30, 2007, was 42. The median number of clients ranged from 38 in facilities operated by tribal governments to 55 in facilities operated by local governments. The relatively high median number of clients in facilities operated by the Federal government (53 clients) is because of the median of 105 clients in treatment at VA facilities.

Facility size varied by type of care offered. In facilities offering outpatient care, the median number of clients was 48. However, this represented a range by type of outpatient care, from 1 client in outpatient detoxification on March 30, 2007, to 30 clients in regular outpatient care and 132 clients receiving outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance. In facilities offering residential (non-hospital) care, the median number of clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, was 18. In hospital inpatient facilities, the median number of clients was 9.

The median number of clients also varied according to primary focus of the facility. It ranged from 20 clients in treatment in facilities focused

on providing mental health services to 46 clients in treatment in facilities providing substance abuse treatment services.

Table 4.5. There was little difference in facility size by facility operation, but there were differences by the primary focus of the facility. Facilities with a primary focus on the provision of mental health services tended to be smaller than facilities providing substance abuse treatment services. Only 9 percent of facilities with a mental health focus had 120 or more clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, and 38 percent had fewer than 15 clients in treatment on that date. In contrast, 23 percent of facilities with a substance abuse treatment focus had 120 or more clients in treatment, while 17 percent had fewer than 15 clients in treatment.

# **Facility Capacity and Utilization Rates**

Facilities were asked to report the number of residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment. Utilization rates were calculated by dividing the number of residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient clients by the number of residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient designated beds. Because substance abuse treatment clients may also occupy non-designated beds, utilization rates could be more than 100 percent.

Table 4.6. Some 3,260 facilities reported having 109,617 residential (non-hospital) beds designated for substance abuse treatment. On March 30, 2007, 92 percent of all residential (non-hospital) beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use.<sup>2</sup> In residential (non-hospital) facilities, utilization rates ranged from 85 percent in facilities operated by local governments to 96 percent in residential (non-hospital)

facilities operated by State governments. By facility focus, utilization rates ranged from 88 percent in facilities providing general health care to 105 percent in facilities providing mental health treatment services.

Table 4.7. Some 921 facilities reported having 13,387 hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment. On March 30, 2007, 84 percent of all hospital inpatient beds designated for substance abuse treatment were in use.<sup>3</sup> In hospital inpatient facilities, utilization rates ranged from 71 percent in facilities operated by local governments to 104 percent in hospital inpatient facilities operated by Federal governments. By facility focus, utilization rates ranged from 65 percent in facilities focused on general health care to 106 percent in facilities focused on mental health services.

Figure 9 and Tables 4.6 and 4.7 show the distribution of facility-level utilization rates for residential (non-hospital) beds and for hospital inpatient beds. Facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds had generally higher utilization rates than facilities with hospital inpatient beds. Sixty percent of facilities with residential (non-hospital) beds had utilization rates of 91 to 100 percent or more. Forty-three percent of facilities with hospital inpatient beds had utilization rates in that range, and 22 percent had utilization rates of 50 percent or less compared to only 7 percent of residential (non-hospital) facilities.


#### **Services Provided**

Facilities were asked about the types of services they provided. Services were grouped into six broad categories. (See Appendix B, the 2007 N-SSATS Questionnaire, Questions 12-16 for specific services within each category.)

Residential (non-hospital) utilization rates are based on a subset of 3,042 facilities that reported for themselves alone and that reported numbers greater than zero for both designated beds and clients.

Tables 4.8 and 4.9. The majority of facilities provided one or more of the specific services in each category, although the availability of services varied by facility operation and primary focus.

Assessment and pre-treatment services. At least one of the six assessment and pre-treatment services was provided in 98 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by Federal or tribal governments were most likely to offer any individual service. Private for-profit facilities were least likely to offer all but one of the services.

Screening for substance abuse was provided in 92 percent of all facilities and comprehensive substance abuse assessment was provided in 89 percent. There was little difference in provision of these services by facility operation or facility focus.

Screening for mental health disorders was provided in 60 percent of all facilities, and comprehensive mental health assessment in 42 percent. In facilities focused on providing mental health services or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, screening for mental health disorders was provided by 93 percent and 87 percent, respectively. Comprehensive mental health assessment was provided by 91 percent and 78 percent, respectively.

Outreach to persons in the community who may need treatment was provided by 49 percent of all facilities, ranging widely from 41 percent of private for-profit facilities to 86 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments. There was little variation by facility focus.

Interim services for clients when immediate admission was not possible were provided by 40 percent of all facilities, ranging from 33 percent of private for-profit facilities to 66 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments. There was little variation by facility focus.

Counseling. The use of counseling in substance treatment programs was reported by 99 percent of all facilities. Individual counseling was reported by 96 percent of all facilities, group counseling by 89 percent, and family counseling by 72 percent. Marital/couples counseling was used by less than half (45 percent) of all facilities. There was little variation in the provision of counseling services by facility operation or facility focus.

Pharmacotherapies. Pharmacotherapies were used in 47 percent of all facilities. Medications for psychiatric disorders were the most common pharmacotherapy (35 percent of all facilities), followed by Campral and Antabuse (17 percent each), nicotine replacement (16 percent), naltrexone (15 percent), buprenorphine (14 percent), and methadone (11 percent).

Availability differed widely by facility operation and facility focus. Pharmacotherapies were most likely to be used in Federal government-operated facilities (79 percent) and least likely to be used in tribal government-operated facilities (38 percent). Availability of pharmacotherapies by facility focus ranged from 37 percent of facilities providing substance abuse treatment services to 85 percent of facilities providing general health care.

Testing. Testing services were provided in 87 percent of all facilities. Urine screening for drugs or alcohol was the most common procedure (83 percent of all facilities), followed by breathalyzer or other blood alcohol testing (58 percent).

Communicable disease testing was provided by a much smaller range of facilities—TB screening by 34 percent, HIV testing by 29 percent, Hepatitis C screening by 23 percent, Hepatitis B screening by 22 percent, and STD testing by 21 percent.

The availability of the communicable disease tests was generally more variable than that of the substance abuse tests, by both facility operation and facility focus. In facilities operated by the Federal government, each of the disease tests was provided in 65 percent or more of facilities, while communicable disease tests were available in only about 20 percent of privately operated facilities (both for-profit and non-profit).

Among facilities focused on general health care communicable disease tests were provided by 83 to 84 percent of facilities, but were available in only 21 to 34 percent of all other facilities.

Transitional services. Transitional services were provided by 96 percent of all facilities. Discharge planning was provided by 92 percent of all facilities, and aftercare/continuing care services by 81 percent. There was little variation in the provision of these services by facility operation of facility focus.

Ancillary services. One or more of the 17 specified ancillary services were provided by 99 percent of all facilities.

Ancillary services provided by more than half of all facilities included substance abuse education (94 percent); case management (76 percent); social skills development (66 percent); HIV or AIDS education, counseling, or support (56 percent); mental health services (54 percent); and assistance with obtaining social services (52 percent).

Ancillary services provided by 25 percent to 50 percent of facilities included health education other than HIV/AIDS (49 percent), self-help groups (47 percent), monitoring/peer support (45 percent), assistance in locating housing (43

percent), transportation assistance to treatment and domestic violence services (36 percent each), employment counseling (34 percent), and early intervention for HIV (25 percent).

Ancillary services that were rarely provided included child care for clients' children (8 percent), and acupuncture and residential beds for clients' children (4 percent each).

The provision of ancillary services varied widely by facility operation and facility focus. By facility operation, private for-profit facilities were the least likely to provide 15 of the 17 specified ancillary services. By facility focus, those providing mental health services were the least likely to provide 12 of the 17 specified ancillary services.

# Clinical/Therapeutic Approaches

Table 4.10. A question about the frequency with which a facility used specific clinical/therapeutic approaches was added to the 2007 N-SSATS survey. Substance abuse counseling was reported to be used often by 96 percent of all facilities. Relapse prevention was used often by 91 percent of all facilities. Cognitive-behavioral therapy was used often by 68 percent of all facilities and used sometimes by 22 percent. A 12-step approach was used often by 66 percent of all facilities and used sometimes by 21 percent.

Approaches used less frequently were motivational interviewing (often, 56 percent; sometimes, 28 percent); anger management (often, 47 percent; sometimes, 39 percent); and brief intervention (often, 41 percent; sometimes, 41 percent). Approaches used least frequently were trauma-related counseling (often, 24 percent; sometimes, 41 percent; rarely or never, 32 percent).

Contingency management was used often by 20 percent all facilities, sometimes by 31 percent, and rarely or never by 32 percent. Nineteen per-

cent responded that they were unfamiliar with this clinical/therapeutic approach.

# **Programs or Groups for Specific Client Types**

Facilities may offer treatment programs or groups designed to address the specific needs of specific client types. These client types include adolescents, clients with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders, persons with HIV or AIDS, gays or lesbians, and pregnant or postpartum women. Special programs or groups may also be offered for adult women, for adult men, and for seniors or older adults. Many facilities offer treatment for persons arrested while driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs (DUI) or driving while intoxicated (DWI), as well as for other criminal justice clients.

Tables 4.11a and 4.11b. Overall, 82 percent of facilities offered at least one special program or group to serve a specific client type. High proportions of facilities offering a broad range of special programs or groups were found in tribal government-operated and private non-profit facilities. Facilities operated by the Federal government were the least likely to offer special programs for most client types, and only 65 percent offered special programs for any client type.

Facilities providing a mix of substance abuse treatment and mental health services had high proportions of facilities offering a broad range of special programs or groups. Facilities providing general health care were the least likely to offer special programs for most client types, and only 65 percent offered special programs for any client type.

Clients with co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders. Programs or groups for clients with co-occurring mental health and

substance abuse disorders were provided by 37 percent of all facilities. Availability was greatest in State government-operated facilities (49 percent) and in facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (52 percent).

Adult women. Special programs or groups for adult women were offered in 32 percent of all facilities. Availability was greatest in local government-operated facilities (39 percent) and in facilities providing substance abuse treatment services (35 percent).

Adolescents. Thirty-one percent of facilities offered programs or groups for adolescents. Availability was greatest in tribal government-operated facilities (47 percent) and in facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (42 percent).

DUI/DWI offenders. Special programs or groups for DUI/DWI offenders were offered by 31 percent of all facilities. Availability was greatest in private for-profit facilities (46 percent) and in facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (37 percent).

Criminal justice clients.<sup>4</sup> Twenty-seven percent of all facilities provided programs or groups for criminal justice clients other than DUI/DWI offenders. Availability was greatest in local government-operated facilities (33 percent) and in facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (31 percent).

Adult men. Special programs or groups for adult men were offered in 25 percent of all facilities. Availability was greatest (28 percent each) in tribal government-operated facilities

and in facilities providing substance abuse treatment services.

Pregnant or postpartum women. Programs or groups for pregnant or postpartum women were offered by 14 percent of all facilities. Availability was greatest in local government-operated facilities (20 percent) and in facilities providing substance abuse treatment services (16 percent).

Persons with HIV or AIDS. Ten percent of facilities offered programs or groups for persons with HIV or AIDS. There was little variation by facility operation or by facility focus. Availability was greatest in State government-operated facilities (14 percent) and in facilities providing general health care (11 percent).

Seniors or older adults. Seven percent of all facilities provided programs or groups for seniors or older adults. There was little variation by facility operation or by facility focus.

*Gays or lesbians*. Special programs or groups for gays or lesbians were offered in 6 percent of all facilities. There was little variation by facility operation or by facility focus.

# Services in Sign Language for the Hearing Impaired and in Languages Other than English

Tables 4.12a and 4.12b. Substance abuse treatment services in sign language for the hearing impaired were offered in 30 percent of all facilities. Facilities operated by local and State governments were most likely to offer these services (48 percent and 43 percent, respectively), followed by private non-profits (34 percent). Facilities providing mental health services (39 percent), or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (35 percent) were the most likely to offer sign language.

Substance abuse treatment services in languages other than English were provided in 49 percent

of all facilities. This proportion ranged from 28 percent in Federal government-operated facilities to 63 percent in local government-operated facilities. There was little variation according to the facilities' primary focus, and the proportions offering treatment in languages other than English ranged from 40 to 52 percent among the languages specified.

Substance abuse treatment services in languages other than English could be provided by staff counselors, on-call interpreters, or both. Of the facilities offering these services, 42 percent reported that the services were provided by staff counselors only. Thirty-eight percent used on-call interpreters only, and 20 percent used both staff counselors and on-call interpreters.

Spanish was the most commonly reported language among facilities using staff counselors to provide services in languages other than English. It was reported by 91 percent of these facilities. Treatment services in American Indian/Alaska Native languages were offered in 4 percent of these facilities overall, but in 90 percent of those operated by tribal governments and in 73 percent of those operated by the Indian Health Service.

#### **Client Detoxification Substance**

In 2007, a question was added to the N-SSATS survey asking facilities that provided detoxification services about the specific substances for which these services were provided.

Table 4.13. Opiate detoxification was provided by 93 percent of all facilities that provided detoxification services, alcohol detoxification by 78 percent, cocaine detoxification by 64 percent, and detoxification from other substances by 39 percent. Medications were routinely used as part of the detoxification process in 84 percent of the facilities offering detoxification services.

Private for-profit detoxification facilities differed from private non-profit and government-operated facilities. Almost all (97 percent) reported opiate detoxification, but only 62 percent or less reported detoxification from other substances. Use of medications during detoxification was reported by 91 percent. Among detoxification facilities operated by other entities, tribal government-operated detoxification facilities were by far the least likely to offer detoxification from any of the substances listed, or to use medications during detoxification. Federal government operated detoxification facilities were most likely to report detoxification for most substances listed, as well as the use of medications during detoxification.

There was little variation by facility focus. However, 99 percent of facilities providing general health care offered alcohol detoxification, and 99 percent used medications during detoxification.

#### **Client Outreach**

Facilities were asked whether the facility operated a hot-line responding to substance abuse problems and whether it had a web site providing information about its substance abuse treatment programs.

Table 4.14. A hot-line responding to substance abuse problems was operated by 22 percent of all facilities. Hot-line operation varied widely by facility operation. Hot-lines were most common among local government-operated facilities (36 percent) and least common among Federal government-operated facilities (11 percent). There was less variation by facility focus.

Web sites providing information about a facility's substance abuse treatment programs were maintained by 65 percent of all facilities. Web site availability varied widely by facility operation. Web sites were most common among private non-profit facilities (74 percent) and least common among tribal government-operated facilities (31 percent). There was less variation by facility focus.

# Facility Licensing, Certification, or Accreditation

Facilities were asked to report the agencies or organizations that licensed, certified, or accredited them. These included the State substance abuse agency, mental health department, and public health department or board of health; hospital licensing authority; and other State/local agency or other organization. Also included were accreditation organizations: JCAHO, CARF, NCQA, and COA.<sup>5</sup>

Tables 4.15a and 4.15b. Overall, 95 percent of all facilities reported that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by one or more agencies or organizations. The State substance abuse agency licensed, certified, or accredited 81 percent of facilities; the State public health department/board of health, 41 percent; the State mental health department, 34 percent; and the hospital licensing authority, 7 percent. JCAHO and CARF were cited as accrediting organizations by 21 percent and 20 percent of all facilities, respectively. Accreditation by COA or NCQA was relatively rare (5 percent and 3 percent, respectively). Eleven percent of all facilities reported licensing, certification, or accreditation by a State or local agency or other organization that was not specifically listed in the N-SSATS questionnaire.

Facility licensing, certification, or accreditation was associated with facility operation. Federal and tribal government-operated facilities were by far the least likely to be licensed, certified, or accredited by any of the State agencies. Private for-profit organizations and tribal government-operated facilities were most likely to report licensing by an agency or organization not listed on the questionnaire (15 percent and 14 percent,

respectively). Conversely, they were least likely to report licensing by the hospital authority or accreditation by one of the organizations listed. Facilities operated by the Federal government were the most likely to report high rates of licensure or accreditation by JCAHO (80 percent), the hospital licensing authority (18 percent), and the NCQA (8 percent).

Facilities whose focus was the provision of mental health services reported high proportions of facilities licensed by the State mental health department, JCAHO, and the hospital licensing authority (70 percent, 36 percent, and 17 percent respectively). Facilities whose focus was general health care had high rates of licensure, certification, or accreditation by JCAHO and the hospital licensing authority (67 percent, 28 percent, respectively), but also by the NCQA (14 percent. Licensing rates for facilities focused on provision of a mix of substance abuse services and mental health treatment services generally fell between the rates for those providing substance abuse or mental health separately.

Tables 4.16a and 4.16b. Facility licensing, certification, or accreditation was also associated with the type of care offered. The State substance abuse agency licensed, certified, or accredited 82 percent each of facilities offering outpatient treatment and residential (non-hospital) treatment, but only 60 percent of facilities offering hospital inpatient treatment. Conversely, the State mental health department, licensed, certified, or accredited 46 percent of hospital inpatient facilities but only 36 percent of outpatient facilities and 26 percent of residential (nonhospital) facilities. Facilities offering hospital inpatient treatment and outpatient methadone maintenance were more likely than other types of care to be licensed, certified, or accredited by the State public health department/board of health.

Hospital inpatient facilities were most likely to be licensed by the hospital licensing authority

(51 percent) and accredited by JCAHO (79 percent), NCQA (12 percent), and COA (6 percent). Several types of outpatient care (detoxification, day treatment/partial hospitalization, and methadone maintenance) also had relatively high rates of hospital authority licensure and agency accreditation, while rates for long-term residential facilities were relatively low.

# **Facility Standard Operating Procedures**

Beginning in 2007, facilities were asked about specific practices they employed as standard operating procedures.

Tables 4.17a and 4.17b. Almost all the standard practices listed were used by 80 percent or more of all facilities. Continuing education for staff was the most widespread, required by 95 percent of all facilities, followed by supervisor case review (93 percent), client satisfaction surveys (89 percent), client drug testing (83 percent), and utilization reviews (81 percent). Case reviews by a quality assurance committee were conducted less frequently (67 percent), as was post-discharge outcome follow-up (64 percent).

There was little variation by facility operation or by facilities' primary focus of activity, although certain types of facilities were considerably less likely to use some of the practices. These exceptions included supervisor case review, used by 75 percent of facilities providing general health care; client satisfaction surveys, conducted by 76 percent of tribal government-operated facilities; client drug testing, used by 51 percent of facilities providing mental health services; and utilization reviews, conducted by 68 percent of tribal government-operated facilities.

#### **Payment Options**

Tables 4.18a and 4.18b. Almost all facilities accepted cash or self-payment (90 percent). More than half accepted private health insurance (63 percent) or Medicaid (53 percent). Medicare and State-financed health insurance were each

accepted by 34 percent of facilities and Federal military insurance by 32 percent. Facilities operated by Federal and tribal governments were least likely to accept cash or self-payment (34 and 44 percent, respectively). Private for-profit and Federal government-operated facilities were less likely to accept Medicare, Medicaid, and State-financed health insurance than were facilities operated by private non-profits and State and local governments.

Facilities providing mental health services were the most likely to accept most of the payment types listed, while facilities providing substance abuse services were least likely to accept most of the payment types.

Access to Recovery (ATR) vouchers were accepted by 10 percent of all facilities. However, this program was offered in only 14 States;<sup>6</sup> the acceptance rates ranged from 11 percent to 63 percent in those States [see Table 6.20].

A sliding fee scale for substance abuse treatment charges was used by 62 percent of all facilities, but availability ranged from 12 percent of Federal government-operated facilities to 82 percent of local government-operated facilities.

More than half (52 percent) of all facilities offered treatment at no charge to eligible clients who could not pay, but availability ranged from 24 percent of private for-profit facilities to 81 percent of facilities operated by tribal governments.

# **Facility Funding**

Facilities were asked about agreements or contracts with managed care organizations for the provision of substance abuse treatment services, and whether the facility received Federal, State, or local government funds for the provision of substance abuse treatment.

Table 4.19. Less than half of all facilities (46 percent) reported that they had agreements or contracts with managed care organizations for the provision of substance abuse treatment services. In general, private non-profit and private for-profit organizations were more likely to have such agreements or contracts (49 and 48 percent, respectively) than were government-operated facilities (41 percent or less). Facilities whose primary focus was the provision of mental health services or a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services were most likely to have agreements or contracts with managed care organizations (56 percent and 55 percent, respectively).

Sixty percent of all facilities received Federal, State, or local government funds for the provision of substance abuse treatment services. Not surprisingly, government-operated and private non-profit organizations were more likely to receive these funds than were private for-profit facilities (between 70 percent and 86 percent, compared to 22 percent for private for-profit organizations).

# **Facilities with Opioid Treatment Programs** (OTPs)

Opioid Treatment Programs (OTPs) are certified by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration to provide medication-assisted therapy in the treatment of opioid addiction. Currently, methadone and buprenorphine are the only opioid medications approved for the treatment of opioid addiction.

OTPs were available at 1,108 (8 percent) of all substance abuse treatment facilities on March 30, 2007 [Table 2.3]. Half (50 percent) of OTPs were operated by private for-profit organizations, compared to 29 percent of all substance abuse treatment facilities [Table 4.1].

*Table 4.20.* Over half (55 percent) of all OTPs provided both maintenance and detoxification. Thirty-seven percent provided maintenance

only, and 8 percent provided detoxification only.

Facilities with OTPs were likely to be dedicated entirely or almost entirely to medication-assisted therapy. Overall, 89 percent of clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, in facilities with OTPs were receiving methadone or buprenorphine. This proportion was highest (97 percent) in private for-profit facilities and in facilities providing substance abuse treatment services (91 percent). Additionally, 68 percent of facilities certified as OTPs reported that all of the clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, were receiving either methadone or buprenorphine.

Of the 265,716 clients receiving one of the two medications approved for the treatment of opioid addiction, 99 percent received methadone and only 3,032 (1 percent) received buprenorphine.

Tables 4.21a and 4.21b. Most facilities with OTPs (93 percent) offered outpatient treatment. Residential (non-hospital) treatment were offered 9 percent, and hospital inpatient treatment were offered by 10 percent of all facilities with OTPs. Outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance was offered in 90 percent of facilities with OTPs, regular outpatient treatment in 62 percent, detoxification in 51 percent, intensive outpatient treatment in 27 percent, and day treat/partial hospitalization in 9 percent.

Federal government-operated facilities with OTPs had the highest proportion of facilities offering more types of care. One-hundred percent of the Federal government-operated facilities offered outpatient treatment, 46 percent offered hospital inpatient treatment, and 41 percent offered residential (non-hospital) treatment. Additionally, 100 percent offered outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance. Private for-profit facilities with OTPs had the lowest proportions of facilities offering residential (non-hospital) and hospital inpatient treatment (4 percent each).

Facilities with OTPs providing substance abuse treatment services were most likely to offer outpatient treatment (94 percent), but least likely to offer residential (non-hospital) or hospital inpatient treatment (7 percent each). Facilities with OTPs providing mental health services were least likely to offer outpatient treatment (67 percent), but most likely to offer hospital inpatient treatment (67 percent).

Tables 4.22a and 4.22b. More than 99 percent of facilities with OTPs reported that they were licensed, certified, or accredited by one or more agencies or organizations. Most facilities with OTPs (86 percent) listed the State substance abuse agency, 58 percent listed the State public health department/board of health, and 21 percent listed the State mental health department. Accreditation was higher among facilities with OTPs than among facilities overall [Table 4.15b]. Accreditation by CARF was 63 percent, compared to 20 percent of all facilities. Accreditation by JCAHO was 33 percent, compared to 21 percent of all facilities. Twenty-four percent of facilities with OTPs reported licensing, certification, or accreditation by a State or local agency or organization that was not specifically listed in the N-SSATS questionnaire, as compared to 11 percent of all facilities combined [Table 4.15b].

Accreditation by JCAHO and CARF were generally inversely related. For example, accreditation by JCAHO was highest in facilities with OTPs that offered hospital inpatient treatment (91 percent), while accreditation by CARF in those facilities was only 20 percent. Conversely, accreditation by CARF was highest among outpatient treatment facilities (65 percent) while JCAHO accreditation was 30 percent.

#### CHAPTER 5

### **CLIENT CHARACTERISTICS**

This chapter describes key characteristics of L the 1,135,425 clients in substance abuse treatment on March 30, 2007. Clients in treatment were defined as: 1) hospital inpatient and residential (non-hospital) clients receiving substance abuse treatment services on March 30, 2007, and 2) outpatient clients who were seen at the facility for a substance abuse treatment or detoxification service at least once during the month of March 2007, and who were still enrolled in treatment on March 30, 2007. The majority of tables in the report are organized according to facility operation and the primary focus of the facility. Facility operation indicates the type of entity responsible for the operation of the facility: private for-profit; private non-profit; or government—local, county, or community; State; Federal; or tribal. Primary focus indicates the services the facility primarily provides: substance abuse treatment services, mental health services, a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services, general health care, or other.

# **Facility Operation and Primary Focus**

Table 5.1. Fifty-five percent of the 1,135,425 clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, were in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations, and 30 percent were in facilities operated by private for-profit organizations. Eight percent of clients were in local government-operated facilities, 4 percent were in State government-operated facilities, 3 percent were in Federal government-operated facilities, and 1 percent were in facilities operated by tribal governments.

Two-thirds (68 percent) of all clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, were in facilities whose

primary focus of activity was the provision of substance abuse treatment services. About one quarter (26 percent) of clients were in facilities whose primary focus of activity was a mix of both mental health and substance abuse treatment services. Four percent of clients were in facilities primarily providing mental health services, and 1 percent were in facilities with a general health care focus.

# Type of Care

*Tables 5.2a, 5.2b, and 5.2c.* The 2007 N-SSATS requested data on clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, who received:

- Outpatient treatment services (regular outpatient treatment, intensive outpatient treatment, day treatment or partial hospitalization, detoxification, methadone/buprenorphine maintenance)
- Residential (non-hospital) treatment services (long-term — more than 30 days, short-term — 30 days or fewer, detoxification)
- Hospital treatment services (inpatient treatment, inpatient detoxification)

Table 5.2b. The majority (90 percent) of the 1,135,425 clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, were enrolled in outpatient treatment. Nine percent were in residential (non-hospital) treatment, and 1 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment.

Just over half (52 percent) of the clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, were in regular outpatient treatment, 22 percent were in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance, 12 percent were in intensive outpatient treatment, 2 percent were in outpatient day treatment or

partial hospitalization, and 1 percent were in outpatient detoxification. In addition, 6 percent of all clients were in long-term residential treatment, 2 percent were in short-term residential treatment, and 1 percent were in residential detoxification.

In each of the operational categories and for each facility focus of activity, clients most frequently received regular outpatient services. However, there was variation for the other types of care delivered. Private non-profit facilities had a more balanced range of types of care (55 percent of clients were in regular outpatient treatment, 16 percent in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance, and 13 percent each in intensive outpatient and residential treatment). In private for-profit facilities, 43 percent of clients were in regular outpatient treatment, while 38 percent were in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance. In facilities operated by State governments, 47 percent of clients were in regular outpatient treatment, 25 percent were in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance, and 11 percent in residential treatment. In facilities whose focus was substance abuse treatment, 44 percent were in regular outpatient treatment, 30 percent were in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance, and 11 percent were in residential treatment. In facilities focused on providing mental health services, the range of types of care was limited, with 79 percent of clients receiving regular outpatient treatment.

Table 5.2c. The majority of clients (55 percent) were in private non-profit facilities. This was true for most of the individual types of care. However, the majority of clients in outpatient detoxification (59 percent) were in private forprofit facilities, as were the majority of clients in outpatient methadone/buprenorphine maintenance (51 percent). More than three-quarters (76 percent) of clients in residential treatment (and 80 percent of clients in long-term residential treatment) were in facilities operated by private non-profit organizations.

# **Substance Abuse Problem and Cooccurring Mental Health Disorders**

Table 5.3. On March 30, 2007, 45 percent of all clients were in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse. Thirty-six percent were in treatment for drug abuse only, and 19 percent were in treatment for alcohol abuse only. Thirty-seven percent of clients were in treatment for co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders.

Private for-profit facilities had the smallest proportion of clients in treatment for both alcohol and drug abuse (33 percent), and the highest proportion in treatment for drug abuse alone (49 percent). Clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone were found in the highest proportions in Federal government-operated facilities (34 percent). Co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders were also found in the highest proportions in Federal government-operated facilities (53 percent).

Facilities providing mental health services had the highest proportion of clients in treatment for co-occurring substance abuse and mental health disorders (64 percent), followed by facilities providing general health care (54 percent), and facilities focused on a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services (49 percent). Substance abuse treatment services had the highest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of drugs alone (42 percent), compared with a range of 22 percent to 25 percent in facilities focused on provision of other services. In turn, facilities providing substance abuse treatment services had the smallest proportion of clients in treatment for abuse of alcohol alone (16 percent), compared with a range of 23 percent to 34 percent in facilities providing other services.

# **Type of Counseling**

Table 5.4. Virtually all (99 percent) of facilities included counseling as part of their substance abuse treatment programs [Table 4.8]. However, the proportion of clients in any given type of counseling on March 30, 2007, was considerably lower. Most clients (79 percent) were in individual counseling, 71 percent were in group counseling, 22 percent were in family counseling, and 8 percent were in marital/couples counseling.

There was little variation in the proportions of clients by facility operation. Private non-profit facilities had slightly higher proportions of clients in individual, group, and family counseling than did private for-profit facilities, which in turn had a higher proportion in marital/couples counseling. Government-operated facilities had slightly higher proportions of clients in group counseling than in individual counseling.

There were greater differences in the proportions of clients in counseling by facility focus. Facilities whose primary focus was the provision of substance abuse treatment had the highest proportions of clients in individual and group counseling (84 percent and 73 percent, respectively), while the lowest proportions were in facilities focused on providing mental health services (62 percent and 45 percent, respectively). Facilities providing a mix of mental health and substance abuse treatment services had the highest proportions of clients in family and marital/couples counseling (24 percent and 12 percent, respectively).

# **Clients Under Age 18**

There were 85,518 clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 30, 2007, some 8 percent of the total 1,135,425 clients in treatment on that date.

Table 5.5. Clients under age 18 in substance abuse treatment on March 30, 2007, were more likely to be in private non-profit facilities than the general client population (64 percent and 55 percent, respectively) [Table 5.1]. Private for-profit facilities accounted for 30 percent of all clients in treatment, but only 20 percent of clients under age 18.

Fifty-five percent of clients under age 18 were in facilities with a primary focus of substance abuse treatment, compared to 68 percent of all clients. A little more than one third (37 percent) of clients under age 18 were in facilities whose focus was provision of a mix of mental health and substance abuse services, compared to 26 percent of the total client population.

Table 5.6. The proportion of adolescents receiving each type of care was similar to the total treatment population [Table 5.2b]. Most (87 percent) were in outpatient treatment, 12 percent were in residential (non-hospital) treatment, and 1 percent were in hospital inpatient treatment.

#### CHAPTER 6

#### STATE DATA

This chapter presents facility data by State and jurisdiction for March 30, 2007. Facilities operated by Federal agencies are included in the States in which the facilities are located, although these facilities may have clients from other States.

*Table 6.1* details the 2007 N-SSATS survey response rate.

*Tables 6.2 to 6.4* provide State- or jurisdictional-level detail for treatment facility and client trends presented in Chapters 2 and 3.

*Tables 6.5 to 6.24* provide State- or jurisdictional-level detail for the facility tables presented in Chapter 4.

*Tables 6.25 to 6.32* provide State- or jurisdictional-level detail for the client tables presented in Chapter 5.

*Table 6.33* presents the number of clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over, according to substance abuse problem treated, by State or jurisdiction.

## **Survey Response**

*Table 6.1.* The overall response rate for the survey was 94.5 percent. Thirty-four States or jurisdictions had response rates that equalled or surpassed the overall rate, including all of the five U.S. jurisdictions, four of which achieved response rates of 100 percent.

#### **Trends**

*Tables 6.2a and 6.2b.* Both the number of substance abuse treatment facilities and the number of clients in treatment were slightly higher on March 30, 2007, than on March 31, 2003.

California, New York, and Florida had the largest numbers of both facilities and clients in treatment on March 30, 2007. Together they accounted for 27 percent of all clients in treatment on that date and 25 percent of all facilities. California had 13 percent of all facilities and 12 percent of all clients. New York had 7 percent of all facilities and 10 percent of all clients, and Florida had 5 percent of all facilities and 5 percent of all clients.

The next five States with the largest number of facilities were, in descending order, Illinois, Michigan, Texas, Pennsylvania, and Washington, with a combined total of 19 percent of all facilities.

The next five States with the greatest number of clients in treatment on March 30, 2007, were, in descending order, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Washington, Michigan, and Ohio, with a combined total of 19 percent of all clients in treatment.

# Clients in Treatment per 100,000 Population Aged 18 and Older

*Table 6.33.* For the United States, there were 458 clients in treatment per 100,000 population aged 18 and over on March 30, 2007.

The rate was highest for persons with both alcohol and drug abuse (203 per 100,000 population aged 18 and over), followed by drug abuse only (170 per 100,000 population aged 18 and over), and alcohol abuse only (86 per 100,000 population aged 18 and over). While these rates can suggest the extent of the underlying substance abuse problem, they also reflect the level of resources available for treatment and should be interpreted with caution.

Figure 10 maps the rates of clients in treatment by State by quartile of rates—there are 12 or 13 14 States in each quartile.

## APPENDIX A

## N-SSATS BACKGROUND

## **Survey History**

N-SSATS has evolved from national survey efforts begun in the 1970s by the National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) to measure the scope and use of drug abuse treatment services in the United States. The sixth of these surveys, conducted in 1976, introduced the data elements and format that have formed the core of subsequent surveys. These include organizational focus, service orientation, services available, clients in treatment by type of care, and inpatient/residential capacity. The 1976 survey, called the National Drug Abuse Treatment Utilization Survey, was repeated in 1977 and 1978.

In 1979, the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) became a cosponsor of the survey, alcoholism treatment facilities were added, and the study was renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Utilization Survey. This survey was repeated in 1980 and 1982. In 1984, a one-page version called the National Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program Inventory was used. In 1987, the full version of the survey was reinstated and renamed the National Drug and Alcoholism Treatment Unit Survey (NDATUS). NDATUS was conducted annually from 1989 to 1993.

In 1992, with the creation of SAMHSA, responsibility for conducting the survey shifted to SAMHSA's Office of Applied Studies. The survey was redesigned, and then conducted annually as the Uniform Facility Data Set (UFDS) survey from 1995 to 1998. During these years, the survey was conducted by mail with telephone follow-up of non-respondents. The 1999 survey year was a transition year during which the survey was redesigned, and an abbreviated

telephone survey of treatment facilities was conducted. In 2000, a redesigned full mail survey was reinstated with telephone follow-up; it was renamed the National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS). The reference date for the annual survey had always been the end of September or beginning of October. After the 2000 survey, the reference date was changed to the end of March, and no survey was conducted during 2001.

In 2000, the use of an Internet-based questionnaire was tested, and beginning in 2002, all facilities were offered the opportunity to respond via the Internet

# N-SSATS in the Context of the Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS)

N-SSATS is one of the three components of SAMHSA's Drug and Alcohol Services Information System (DASIS). The core of DASIS is the Inventory of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (I-SATS), a continuously-updated, comprehensive listing of all known substance abuse treatment facilities. The other components of DASIS are N-SSATS and the Treatment Episode Data Set (TEDS), a client-level database of admissions to substance abuse treatment. Together, the components provide national- and State-level information on the numbers and characteristics of individuals admitted to alcohol and drug treatment programs and describe the facilities that deliver care to those individuals.

I-SATS is the list frame for N-SSATS. Facilities in I-SATS fall into two general categories and are distinguished by the relationship of the facil-

ity to its State substance abuse agency. These categories are described below.

Treatment facilities approved by State substance abuse agencies

The largest group of facilities (about 14,000 in 2007) includes facilities that are licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State substance abuse agency to provide substance abuse treatment. State DASIS representatives maintain this segment of I-SATS by reporting new facilities, closures, and address changes to SAMHSA. Some facilities are not licensed, certified, or otherwise approved by the State agency. Some private for-profit facilities fall into this category. This group also includes programs operated by Federal agencies, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA), the Department of Defense, and the Indian Health Service. I-SATS records for Federally-operated facilities are updated annually through lists provided by these agencies.

Treatment facilities not approved by State substance abuse agencies

This group of facilities (about 4,000 in 2007) represents the SAMHSA effort since the mid 1990s to make I-SATS as comprehensive as possible by including treatment facilities that State substance abuse agencies, for a variety of reasons, do not fund, license, or certify. Many of these facilities are private for-profit, small group practices, or hospital-based programs. Most of them are identified through periodic screening of alternative source databases. (See *Special efforts to improve survey coverage* below.) State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

## **Survey Coverage**

The use of I-SATS as the list frame for N-SSATS imposes certain constraints related to the unit of response and the scope of facilities included. In addition, the expansion of I-SATS in recent

years to provide a more complete enumeration of substance abuse treatment facilities means that year-to-year comparisons of the numbers of facilities reporting to N-SSATS must be interpreted with caution.

Unit of response

N-SSATS is designed to collect data from each physical location where treatment services are provided. Accordingly, SAMHSA requests that State substance abuse agencies use the point of delivery of service (i.e., physical location) as the defining factor for a facility. It also requests that facilities be included in I-SATS, N-SSATS, and TEDS at the same administrative level so that record linkage among the three data sets is valid. Because of the different State administrative systems, however, there are some inconsistencies in implementation. For example, in some States, multiple treatment programs (e.g., detoxification, residential, and outpatient) at the same address and under the same management have separate State licenses. These are treated as separate by the State substance abuse agency, and are given separate I-SATS ID numbers. In other States, multiple sites are included as a single entity under a parent or administrative unit. In many of these cases, individual sites can report services data in N-SSATS, but client data are available only at a higher administrative level. Beginning in 1995, efforts have been made to identify facility networks and to eliminate duplicate reporting by networks. For most facilities, reporting level remains consistent from year to year. However, beginning in 1998, an emphasis was placed on collecting minimum information from all physical locations, and this has resulted in an increase in the number of facilities.

Special efforts to improve survey coverage

The great majority of treatment facilities in I-SATS are administratively monitored by State substance abuse agencies. Therefore, the scope of facilities included in I-SATS is affected by

differences in State systems of licensure, certification, accreditation, and the disbursement of public funds. For example, some State substance abuse agencies regulate private facilities and individual practitioners while others do not. In some States, hospital-based substance abuse treatment facilities are not licensed through the State substance abuse agency.

To address these differences, SAMHSA conducted a large-scale effort during 1995 and 1996 to identify substance abuse treatment facilities that, for a variety of reasons, were not on I-SATS. Some 15 source lists were considered. and facilities not on I-SATS were contacted to ascertain whether they provided substance abuse treatment. As expected, this yielded a number of hospital-based and small private facilities that were not on I-SATS. (These facilities were surveyed in 1995 and 1996, but they were not included in the published results of the survey until 1997.) Analysis of the results of this effort led to similar but more targeted updates before subsequent surveys. Potential new facilities are identified using data from the American Business Index, the annual American Hospital Association survey, and SAMHSA's biannual Inventory of Mental Health Organizations, the source lists that yielded the most new facilities in 1995 and 1996. Additional facilities are also identified during the survey itself by survey participants, who are asked to report all of the treatment facilities in their administrative networks. All newly identified facilities are initially included as not approved by the State substance abuse agency. State substance abuse agencies are given the opportunity to review these facilities and to add them to the State agency-approved list, if appropriate.

Expansion of survey coverage to include all sites within networks at which treatment was provided yielded a net increase of about 2,600 facilities between 1997 and 1998. These additions were

not necessarily new facilities, but were facilities not previously included in the survey as separate sites. The number of facilities reporting continued to increase in 1999, but at a slower pace, a net increase of 1,800 facilities. The increase between 1998 and 1999 was in large part because of the improved survey response rate (95 percent in 1999 vs. 90 percent in 1998). Between 2003 and 2007, the number of facilities remained constant, at between 13,400 and 13,800. The total number is deceptive, however. There was significant turnover as facilities closed and others opened. (See Table 2.1.)

#### Data collection

Until 1996, State substance abuse agencies distributed and collected the UFDS survey forms. Beginning in 1996, data collection was centralized; since that time, SAMHSA has mailed facility survey forms directly to and collected forms directly from the facilities, and has conducted follow-up telephone interviews with the facility director or his/her designee.

# Non-response

Beginning in 1992, SAMHSA expanded efforts to obtain information from non-responding facilities. A representative sample of non-respondents was contacted and administered an abbreviated version of the survey instrument via telephone. In 1993 and later years, this effort was extended to all non-responding facilities. In 1997, a series of measures was introduced to enhance the survey response rate. These included advance notification and improved methods for updating address and contact information. Between 2003 and 2007, use of these methods and intensive telephone follow-up resulted in an annual non-response rate of only 4 to 5 percent. In 2007, 97 percent of the facilities in the sample either completed the survey or were determined to be closed or otherwise ineligible.

#### Exclusions

In 1997, facilities offering only DUI/DWI programs were excluded; these facilities were reinstated in 1998.

Facilities operated by the Bureau of Prisons (BOP) were excluded from the 1997 UFDS survey and subsequent surveys because SAMHSA conducted a separate survey of correctional facilities.<sup>1</sup> During that survey, it was discovered that jails, prisons, and other organizations treating incarcerated persons only were poorly enumerated on I-SATS. Beginning in 1999, these facilities were identified during the survey and excluded from analyses and public-use data files.

I-SATS and N-SSATS are designed to include specialty substance abuse treatment facilities rather than individuals. Solo practitioners are listed on I-SATS and surveyed in N-SSATS only if the State substance abuse agency explicitly requests that they be included.

Beginning in 2000, halfway houses that did not provide substance abuse treatment were included on I-SATS and in N-SSATS so that they could be listed in the *National Directory of Drug and Alcohol Abuse Treatment Programs* and on the Treatment Facility Locator (http:/findtreatment.samhsa.gov). These facilities were excluded from analyses and public-use data files.

# **Changes in Survey Content**

Table A.1 shows the major content areas for the survey from 1995 to 2007. Since 1992, SAMHSA has made adjustments each year to the survey design, both to minimize non-response and to include areas of emerging interest such as the role of managed care.

There have also been changes within content areas. For example, in response to concerns about over-reporting of programs or groups for specific client types, the survey question was revised in 2003 to distinguish between those facilities that accepted specific client types and those facilities that offered specially designed programs or groups for that client type. As a result, the number and proportion of facilities offering programs or groups for each of the specified client types decreased after 2002. Surveys from 2003 and later are believed to more accurately represent the number and proportions of facilities providing programs or groups for the specified client types.


