Western USSR

1. Strategic Missile units of Marshal of the Soviet Union K. S. Moskalenko's command [i.e. Marshal Biryuzov's command] are located only in the rear, echeloned in depth (eshallonirovanny v glubine). Some of these units are stationed in the Carpathian and Baltic Military Districts; there

are none in East Germany. However, storage depots are located in last Germany which Hold empty weekers for either nuclear or conventional charges. These depots are at the disposal of both Moskalenko and Chief Marshel of Artillery S. S. Varentsov.

North: Murmansk Area

2. Missile launch sites with reinforced concrete pads are located in the Marmansk Colast, in the former Morthern Military District, which has now been transformed to the Leningrad Military District. These sites are directed against England. The exact geographic coordinates of these sites are known only to a strictly limited number of individuals in the General Staff. Troops stationed at the sites live completely relf-contained, isolated lives under strict KCB surveillance.

South: Transcaucasus

- 3. Launch sites are located in the Transcaucasus directed; against Turkey, Iran, and Pakistan. From bases in the Georgian. SOR missiles can be fired to ranges of 2,000 to 3,000 kms. Adama, Turkey, can be hit, but so far (mil-1961) there are not enough missiles available to strike all largets in those countries.
- 4. At the time of the U.S. Incding in Lebanon (July 1958), Khrushthev ordered a state of battle readiness; Marshal of the Soviet Union Konstantin K. Rokowayaskiy went down to the Transcancasus and the Commander of the Artillery of the Ground Forces visited Tailisi and toured the area. This alert was repeated at the time of the protest to Turkey and Pakistan over the U-2 incident. Laurch pads were made ready, equipment was prepared nearby underground, in bunkers and all cambuflaged. Battle readiness implies that when necessary the missile can be set up and loaded; there is no "readiness" whereby everything is loaded and ready to fire. They were ready to strike Adams.

Far East

5. In early 1961, an artillery corps commander named loffe was stationed in the Far Bastern Military District "on the islands". He had previously served in missile units, is a "Hero of the Soviet Union", and was described as one of the few Jews left serving in a position of importance."

Troop Fraining in the Use of Pactical and Strategic (Medium Range) Missiles

- 6. All training exercises these days include live firing either free flight rockets or guided missiles, though the latter are only fired from a limited number of ranges. The recent exercises in Rumania also included live firing of missiles, which were of the first type to be ideaed to trapps about three years ago. There have been cases of failure on the launch pad even on occasions when Khrushebev has been present.
- 7. During the summer of 1960, large-scale maneuvers were hold in the Transcaucasus under the direction of Marshal of the Soviet Union Vasiliy I. Chaybov, which were attended by Khrushchev and Minister of Defense Malinovskiy. Frictice training was carried out in which missiles were fired to the Trakestan (sic) impact area. Senior officers visited Thilisl and Baku, and inspected all the missile units in the area.
- 8. The range in the Lvov area is in fact two ranges close together, located near Shklo and Yauer respectively. They have come into use recently, and are convolled by both local (sic) am Soviet troops.
- 9. Lt. Gen. Goffe, who was killed in the helicopter accident on the Nikolayev range, was until late summer 1960 Artillery Commander for the Iwov (Carpathian) Hilltary District. He had had a long-standing association with missiles, and was a noted theoretician.
