MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: Safety Recommendations with Energy Saving Measures

- 1. **PURPOSE:** The purpose of this memorandum is to recommend minimum safety standards and requirements be considered when determining work area lighting and temperature settings.
- 2. FACTS: The Bavarian Military Community (BMC) has been directed to reduce operating cost associated with energy consumption. Two areas that are being addressed are work area / place illumination and temperature. The BMC can undoubtedly save resources and funds with reductions in these areas. Incorporating these minor safety recommendations will only increase the long term savings that are often associated with work place injuries.
- a. Work Place Temperature: The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) recommends employers maintain work place temperatures in the range of 68 to 76° Fahrenheit (F) or 20 to 24° Celsius (C), and humidity control in the range of 20 to 60%. Office temperature and humidity conditions are generally a matter of human comfort rather than hazards that could cause death or serious physical harm. OSHA cannot cite the General Duty Clause for personal discomfort nor hold the employer accountable for a set temperature. German law (ASR A3.5), however, requires that wherever light office work is performed the temperature be 68° F (20° C) in work areas where it is combined with physical movement. The following standards apply: 66° F (19° C) for light physical movement; 62° F (17° C) for medium physical movement; and, 54° F (12° C) for heavy physical movement (see attached ASR A3.5). Temperature measurements are based on work activity and type of location. For example, measurements for general office space would be performed 60 centimeters (24 inches) from the floor; and, measurements for a warehouse or maintenance facility where prolonged standing is normal would be performed 1.1 meters (3.6 feet) from the floor.
- b. **Lighting:** Both US and German regulations are very specific with the lighting requirement in both indoor and outdoor areas. The most common area requirements are: 30-50 foot candle (fc) for general office space; 10-20 fc for corridors, stairs and hallways; 100-200 fc for machine work (fine detail); 6-10 fc for parking areas; and, 20-30 fc for cross walks (see attached ASR-A3.4, US LUX2, US LUX).
- 3. **RECOMMENDATIONS:** Consider setting the temperatures and lighting within the attached parameters to ensure the work force is protected as the BMC implements cost saving measures.

Owners bringing pets into Germany will pay new fee starting Feb. 1

HEIDELBERG, Germany – Members of the U.S. forces community who bring their pets along when they arrive in Germany for assignment will be charged a fee by German authorities beginning Feb. 1.

The fee will be charged during arrivals at Ramstein Air Base and Frankfurt International Airport.

At Ramstein an examination fee of €55 per pet owner will be charged for all pets imported into Germany from outside the European Union. Kaiserslautern County officials said the fee is being levied in accordance with European Union regulations designed to prevent the introduction and dissemination of rabies.

Upon arrival at Ramstein, pets will be examined by veterinary officials near the passenger terminal's baggage claim area. Owners may pay the fee by credit card only.

Owners arriving with their pets at Frankfurt International Airport will also pay a fee. That fee is €35 per accompanied pet or €55 for an unaccompanied pet, and increases by 50 percent for pets that arrive on a weekend or holiday.

Payment of the fee is the responsibility of the pet owner, and cannot be claimed for reimbursement on an official travel voucher, according to officials with the U.S. Army Europe Office of the Judge Advocate. However, while OJA experts said the fee is prohibited from reimbursement under the provisions of the DoD Joint Travel Regulations, pet owners may be able to claim the fee as a deductible moving expense on their federal income tax returns.

While Ramstein and Frankfurt are the only locations currently slated to begin imposing the fee Feb. 1, because it is based on EU regulation other European Union ports of entry could enact similar fees in the future.
