On October 14, 2011, the Rural Utilities Service (RUS) issued a proposed rule to provide loans and grants to facilitate the construction, acquisition, or improvement of infrastructure projects in Substantially Underserved Trust Areas (SUTA). The Intent is to implement Section 906 F of the Rural Electrification Act (7 U.S.C. 960f) by providing the process by which eligible applicants may apply for funding by the agency. Comments must be submitted on or before January 17, 2012.
