

# CONGRESSIONAL BULLETIN

July 20, 2011

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#### **HIGHLIGHTS:**

- Horn of Africa: Early this morning, the United Nations announced that a famine has been declared in Somalia. Across the eastern Horn of Africa, more than 11 million people are now in need of emergency assistance to survive. The United States is one of the largest donors of emergency assistance to the region, helping more than 4.4 million of those in need and providing over \$459 million to date in fiscal year 2011. Administrator Shah, who is in the Horn of Africa as of this writing, offered these remarks in response to the famine declaration. Through the Feed the Future Initiative, the USG is also working to address the root causes of hunger and malnutrition. On July 6, the Agency activated a regional Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART) to monitor regional drought conditions and coordinate response activities with other donors. Last week, USAID also stood up a Washington-based task force on the crisis, chaired by **Deputy Administrator Donald Steinberg** and led by Assistant Administrator of the Bureau for Democracy, Conflict, and Humanitarian Assistance Nancy Lindborg. On July 11, the Deputy Administrator and Deputy Assistant Administrator for Africa Raja Jandhyala traveled to the Dolo Ado refugee camp on the Ethiopia/Somalia border to assess current needs and conditions. Paul Weisenfeld, Assistant to the Administrator for the Bureau for Food Security, traveled to Kenya July 11-18 to assess the current drought as well as Kenya's Feed the Future programs. Following a visit to Somalia and Kenya in late May, Nancy Lindborg testified on the humanitarian situation in Somalia on July 7 before the House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Africa, Global Health, and Human Rights. - South Sudan Independence: South Sudan became Africa's 54<sup>th</sup> nation on July 9 in an event attended by delegations of many nations, including the United States. <u>Deputy Administrator</u> <u>Donald Steinberg attended the independence ceremony with the U.S. delegation</u>, headed by U.S. Ambassador to the UN Susan Rice. • Saving Lives at Birth: Join us July 26-28, as USAID hosts a "Development Xchange" here in the Ronald Reagan Building in association with the Agency's Grand Challenge around "Saving Lives at Birth." An estimated 150,000 women die each year in the 48 hours following a child's birth. Through our Grand Challenge for Development, USAID has sought low-cost, far-reaching innovations from members of the general public. Next week's event will highlight the work of 77 innovators from around the world who will present their projects to help save lives at birth. #### **PUBLIC EVENTS:**

- Administrator in Tunisia: Prior to his travel to the Horn of Africa (see Highlights above),
   Administrator Shah was in Tunisia this week to review current assistance strategies and survey how the Agency may further support the country's democratic transition. During this trip, the Administrator met with young entrepreneurs, farmers, business leaders, representatives of civil society organizations, and government officials to hear first-hand from a broad range of counterparts.
- **Tidewater Meeting:** From July 20-22, Deputy Administrator **Donald Steinberg** will be in the United Kingdom to participate in the annual Tidewater conference of development ministers. This year's discussion will focus on policy reform, economic growth, and the challenges of development in the Middle East and North Africa.

- USAID Gates Foundation DIV on Water, Sanitation and Hygiene: USAID and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation have established WASH for Life, a new program in the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) sector. Over the next four years, the partnership will use USAID's <u>Development Innovation Ventures</u> (DIV) to identify and test approaches to costeffective and sustained services in developing countries.    Disaster Risk Management and Food Security Sector recently launched the <u>Atlas of Ethiopian</u>
   <u>Livelihoods</u>. With the current drought in the Horn of Africa, this uniquely comprehensive data
   set provides an important tool for planning development initiatives, strengthening early warning

- preparations and emergency responses, and identifying particularly vulnerable populations so that USAID and other humanitarian organizations can effectively provide assistance.

## **USAID IN THE NEWS:**

- <u>Voice of America</u> aired a TV piece on the drought in the Horn of Africa. Featuring **Moffatt Ngugi**,
   a USAID Advisor in the Bureau for Food Security, the video emphasizes the importance of long term solutions such as Feed the Future to develop markets and strengthen value chains to
   improve food security.
- <u>CNN</u>, <u>McClatchy Newspapers</u>, and <u>The Washington Post</u> reported on July 12 that at a speech to
  the U.S. Global Leadership Coalition, Secretary of State <u>Hillary Clinton</u> cited the importance of
  foreign aid and how the State Department and USAID are using "commercial diplomacy" to help
  U.S. companies compete and win in the future.
- In a July 13 interview with <u>The Huffington Post</u>, **Administrator Shah** discussed the current drought and food crisis in the Horn of Africa. Shah stated that the food shortages are putting millions of lives at risk and threatening to further destabilize a troubled region of the world.
- Foreign Policy's <u>The Cable</u> blog reported on July 14 that in a recent interview with Deputy Secretary of State for Management and Resources **Tom Nides**, the State Department and USAID have a national security mandate. "We are helping countries through Feed the Future, Global Health Initiatives, climate change, and economic support funding. We're doing that because we're building up these countries to be more self-reliant and have stronger economies. By doing that, that helps our national security," said Nides.

On July 17, <u>The Washington Post</u> reported on USAID's aid efforts in a post-Mubarak Egypt. The
Agency has been providing pro-democracy grants to Egyptians in order to build businesses and
promote transparent, democratic governance.
