- Have there been significant technological advances in BMPs, soil filtration, building construction, energy consumption since 1998?



Thank you for contacting Metropolitan Area Planning Agency (MAPA) in your letter dated January 12, 2012 in reference to intergovernmental coordination pertaining to a proposed national cemetery at a 235-acre site located on the northeast corner of South 144th Street and Schram Road in Sarpy County, Nebraska. The purpose of this correspondence to provide comments pertaining to the proposed activities at this site.

MAPA is designated as the regional Council of Governments and Economic Development District (EDD) serving a fivecounty territory in eastern Nebraska and western Iowa which includes Sarpy County. Our membership includes the five counties, 38 cities, and nineteen special purpose districts, with whom we work closely on matters pertaining to transportation, housing, land use, economic development, and intergovernmental coordination. To this end, we have worked very closely over the years with our local economic development partners and our regional planning and zoning officials to identify optimal uses for undeveloped lands within our region which may contain high potential for future development of any type.

In particular, the subject site has been identified by Sarpy County Economic Development Corporation as a prime site for future commercial/industrial use due to its proximity to key transportation corridors and essential utilities. SCEDC has voiced concerns to MAPA about the permanent conversion of this site to a use other than for commercial/industrial activity, due to the diminished availability of suitable sites for key industry cluster development in our region, and also due to the lack of compatibility with existing and future land uses in the area of the subject site. Essentially, the proposed use does not appear to be compatible with local future land use plans and with our regional strategic economic development goal of identifying and preserving key sites and corridors for commercial/industrial development in the MAPA region.

The MAPA EDD welcomes the prospect of locating a national cemetery in our region and is supportive of efforts to identify an optimal site for the proposed project. We are hopeful that an alternative site for the project might be identified in our region which allows for construction of the cemetery without reducing the availability of prime lands for future economic development activity.

Nebraska Game and Parks Commission (NGPC) staff members have reviewed the information for the proposal identified above. The project would involve the selection of a site for the future proposed construction and operation of a National Cemetery of about 235 acres in size. This review was requested pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

The project would not impact any NGPC State Park, State Recreation, or State Wildlife Management Areas, as none are located in the immediate project area.

The project site is located within the range of the state-listed threatened Western prairie fringed orchid (*Platanthera praeclara*). The Western prairie fringed orchid is a plant species that occurs in native tall or mixed-grass prairies that are associated with wet meadows. Although the plant can be a colonizer species and grow on disturbed areas, it is found in greatest abundance on high quality prairie. The plant blooms in late June to July. Based on our review of 2010 aerial photography, the site looks to be mostly composed of agricultural land uses. Land that is being used for agricultural purposes would not be suitable habitat for the orchid. However, if any areas of native prairie vegetation exist within the project site, then those areas should be assessed to determine if they could provide suitable habitat for the orchid. Results from a habitat assessment, if conducted, should be provided to us for review. No other state-listed threatened and endangered species would be adversely impacted by the proposed project.

In general, NGPC has concerns for impacts to wetlands, streams and riparian habitats. We encourage that impacts to wetlands, streams, and associated riparian corridors be avoided and minimized, and that any unavoidable impacts to these habitats be mitigated. If any fill materials will be placed into any wetlands or streams as a result of the proposed project, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers should be contacted to determine if a 404 permit is needed.

Under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act (MBTA) (16 U.S.C. 703-712: Ch 128 *as amended*) construction activities in grassland, wetland, stream, and woodland habitats that would otherwise

result in the taking of migratory birds, eggs, young, and/or active nests should be avoided. The primary nesting season for migratory birds is from April 1 to July 15. However, some species of migratory birds are known to nest outside of this period. Construction activities should be scheduled to avoid impacting migratory bird nesting. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Ecological Services Office in Grand Island should be contacted for information on how to avoid the unnecessary take of migratory birds.

I have received your letter of January 12, 2012 concerning this site and possible improvement.

The Nebraska Department of Roads has the following concerns with this improvement:

- 1. The N-50 access locations are established and will not be changed. Therefore any access from N-50 will be via existing access locations.
- 2. A Traffic Impact Study (TIS) will be required by the developer to determine whether any improvements need to be made on the highway due to additional traffic or operational concerns. The design and construction of any highway improvements will be the responsibility of the developer.
- The drainage from the site needs to match NDOR's design flow for drainage structures under N-50. Any
 retainage, if needed will occur on the cemetery property before being released to NDOR structures. A drainage
 study will be required.
- 4. A NDOR Right-of-way permit shall be submitted and shall include the TIS, the Drainage Study, site plans for drainage control, driveway plans and highway improvements for NDOR approval. This submittal can be discussed and coordinated as this development proceeds.



We have reviewed the letter from TTL Associates, Inc. requesting comments on the selection of a site for the future proposed construction and operation of a national cemetery. The project is located in the vicinity of 41.13613°N, 96.13432°W, in Section 36, Township 14 North, Range 11 East, in Sarpy County, Nebraska.

The Corps of Engineers is responsible for administering Federal laws that regulate certain activities in waters of the United States. The authority applicable to this responsibility is Section 404 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. 1344), which prohibits the discharge of dredged or fill material into lakes, streams or wetlands without authorization in the form of a Department of the Army permit, and Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 which regulates all work or structures in or affecting the course, condition, or capacity of navigable waters of the United States.

Based on the information provided, our preliminary review indicates that "Waters of the U.S." may be located within the project area and may potentially be impacted by the proposed project. This responds to your January 18, 2012, request to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) regarding the subject project. The Service has responsibility for conservation and management of fish and wildlife resources for the benefit of the American public under the following authorities: 1) Endangered Species Act of 1973 (ESA), 2) Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act, 3) Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act, and 4) Migratory Bird Treaty Act. The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires compliance with all of these statutes and regulations.

Based on the information you have provided, at this time, it appears unlikely that your project would have significant environmental impacts on the trust resources under our authority. Should changes to the proposed project occur or new information regarding fish and wildlife resources become available, further consultation with the Service should be initiated to assess any potential impacts.

All federally listed species under ESA are also State-listed under the Nebraska Nongame and Endangered Species Conservation Act. However, there are also State-listed species that are not federally listed. To determine if the proposed project may affect State-listed species, the Service recommends that the project proponent contact Michelle Koch, Nebraska Game and Parks Commission, 2200 N. 33rd Street, Lincoln, NE 68503-0370.
