1.0 Introduction

Public involvement is a critical part of the Environmental Impact Analysis Process (EIAP) when the U.S. Air Force (USAF) prepares an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The process is directed by the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), Council on Environmental Quality's (CEQ's) regulations on implementing NEPA, and Air Force Instruction (AFI) 32-7061 (32 Code of Federal Regulations [CFR] 989). The intent of scoping is to solicit public input to identify reasonable alternatives, potential impacts, and key issues to be evaluated in the environmental analysis.

The 88th Air Base Wing, Planning and Real Estate Section of the Optimization Branch in the Asset Management Division (88 ABW/CEAOR), through the Air Force Center for Engineering and the Environment, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base (WPAFB), is proposing to implement solutions to improve security, safety, and traffic flow into and on the base. The USAF has determined that an EIS must be prepared to evaluate the environmental impacts associated with the relocation and reconfiguration of traffic entry into Area A on the Base. This includes consolidating, relocating, and reconfiguring vehicle entry control facilities (ECFs); upgrading ECFs to meet current Anti-Terrorism/Force Protection (ATFP) standards; and extending the base perimeter fence to encompass the Kittyhawk Center located on the northeast side of the property, enabling the Kittyhawk Center to be contiguous with Area A.

2.0 Public Scoping Activities

Scoping provides opportunities for the public and government agencies to learn about and comment on the proposed action and alternatives, introduced in the "Description of Proposed Action and Alternatives" section of the EIS, to identify issues of interest or concern to frame EIS analysis and to provide insight into other possible alternatives. The scoping process promotes community involvement and ensures that the EIS will address significant issues important to the people and the natural and physical environment impacted by the USAF decisions. Scoping helps build public confidence in an objective environmental analysis and ultimately provides an informed decision-making process.

The Air Force sought input for the EIS through various public involvement activities. Notably, a Notice of Intent (NOI) in the *Federal Register*, notification of federal, state and local officials, advertising in various local newspapers, a comment period, and two public scoping meetings were conducted as part of the Air Force's outreach and public involvement efforts.

2.1 Federal Register Notice of Intent

The USAF's NOI to prepare an EIS for the Reconfiguration of ECF's appeared in the *Federal Register* on December 28, 2010. The publication of the NOI served as the official starting date for the scoping period. The NOI briefly discussed NEPA requirements, the proposed action, project purpose and need, the resources areas that the USAF will evaluate in the EIS, the scoping meetings, and the close of the comment period. It also provided a point of contact. The NOI is included as Attachment I.

2.2 Notification of Federal, State, and Local Officials

Interagency and Intergovernmental Coordination for Environmental Planning (IICEP) is a federally mandated process for informing and coordinating with other governmental agencies regarding proposed actions. NEPA regulations require intergovernmental notification before any detailed statement of environmental impact is made. Through the IICEP process, concerned federal, state, and local agencies will be notified of the project, invited to participate in the EIS process, and will be provided sufficient time to evaluate the potential environmental impacts of a proposed action. As part of the IICEP process, letters similar to the NOI scoping announcement will be sent to government agencies and stakeholders with an interest in the proposal or with jurisdiction over areas potentially impacted by the proposal. Federal and state agencies include the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA), the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), and the Miami Conservancy District (MCD). The IICEP agencies' and stakeholders' addresses are included in the mailing list presented in Attachment II.

2.3 Paid Advertisements

Paid advertisements were placed in local news media to announce the public scoping meetings dates, times, and locations. The advertisement appeared 15 days before the scoping meetings in the *Beavercreek News-Current*, *Dayton Daily News*, *Fairborn Daily Herald*, Wright State *The Guardian*, and the *Xenia Daily Gazette*. In addition, an advertisement was placed in the WPAFB newspaper, the *Skywrighter*. Copies of all public notice advertisements are included in Attachment I.

2.4 Comment Period

A public comment period was established with the placement to the NOI on December 28, 2010, that ended on March 18, 2011. The public was encouraged to comment during this time. Following is a list of methods the USAF made available for commenting during the scoping process:

- Written Comments submitted by mail, email, or fax. For comments to be considered and/or included in the Draft EIS (DEIS), it was indicated that comments be received by March 18, 2011. Comment cards were available at the scoping meetings for attendees to fill out and submit at the meeting or to take home and mail at a later date. A fax number, email address, and mailing address were published for the public to use in submitting written comments.
- Oral Comments collected at the scoping meetings. Meeting attendees who preferred to speak at the public scoping meetings were required to complete a registration card and then had the opportunity to stand at a microphone to voice their comment. The time allotted for individual public comments was 3 minutes but allowances were made for those going over the time limit. If an individual did not wish to speak publically, they were allowed to voice their comment to a court reporter during the scoping meeting to make a verbatim record of the comment for submittal and review by the USAF.

2.5 Public Scoping Meetings

Two public scoping meetings were scheduled to solicit input from interested parties regarding the proposed project. The scoping meetings were held on March 1 and March 3, 2011, at the Fairborn Government Center located at 44 West Hebble Avenue, in Fairborn, Ohio. This location was chosen based on its proximity to the proposed closing of a portion of State Route (SR) 444 that would potentially have the most impact on the City of Fairborn. Advanced notice of the meetings and location was placed in local newspapers as indicated in Section 2.3.

The scoping meetings were structured in an open house format. This permitted attendees the opportunity to view displays of the proposed project, speak with USAF personnel, and obtain a project fact sheet. Attendees were invited to complete comment cards or submit a speaker registration card. All meeting attendees received a fact sheet, agenda, and comment form.

The open house segment was held between 5:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. A presentation on the project was made by the lead project USAF personnel following the open house. During the presentation, audience members were able to ask questions for clarification of project details.

Following the presentation, a short break commenced. When the meeting reconvened, the public comment portion of the meeting began. Attendees that had submitted a speaker registration card were called by name to stand at the microphone to voice their comment(s). A court reporter was present at both scoping meetings for recording comments verbatim. Additionally, an audio recording was made. The meetings were adjourned when there were no further comments. USAF personnel remained at the meetings to meet individually with interested parties to fulfill any remaining questions or clarification points.

There were 69 attendees at the March 1, 2011, meeting and 52 attendees at the March 3, 2011, meeting. Methods of submitting comments were explained to attendees as they signed in at the beginning of the open house, reiterated during the beginning of the presentation, and again at the end of the presentation. Fifty-two people indicated they wanted to be included on the project mailing list to receive future correspondence concerning the EIS and its progress.

The fact sheet, comment form, and sign-in sheets are included in Attachment II.

3.0 Summary of Scoping Comments

Public scoping meetings serve as the setting for the USAF to gather community-based comments, ideas and opinions. Three attendees spoke during the March 1, 2011 meeting; four spoke during the March 3, 2011 meeting; and one March 3, 2011 attendee made a verbal comment to the court reporter. A summary of verbal comments received during the scoping meetings are listed below. A summary of all comments received during the scoping process conducted from December 28, 2010, until March 18, 2011, is included in Attachment III. In addition, 2 comments were received after the scoping process and are included in Attachment III.

3.1 Scoping Meeting Comments, March 1, 2011

During the March 1, 2011 USAF presentation, the audience was encouraged to ask questions of clarification. Points of clarification and other miscellaneous questions asked during the presentation are summarized below:

Miscellaneous and Questions of Clarification

- What does MILCON stand for?
- Would the (*proposed*) new Gate 1A be (*located*) near the back of the commissary?
- What about the businesses (small businesses) at State Route 444? Are they going to be part of Dayton Yellow Springs?
- Would that be a 24-hour gate or (only during) normal working hours?
- What are the three red dots on the map at the end?
- You showed there would be a re-routing of (*State Route*) 444, from the green to the blue, is that correct? If that were to happen then that would affect (*State Route*) 444 close to Gate 12A?
- Is that what you're talking about re-routing (*State Route*) 444 onto Kauffman between Dayton-Yellow Springs Road and Central?
- So the name of (*State Route*) 444 that exists now would change to a different name, or would we have two (*State Route*) 444s?
- For Gate 1A down to Dayton-Yellow Springs Road on that red line, that would be military or ...? So it would only be for military?
- What about the train that runs along there? SR 444 now does not go across that track. If you move over there, it is going to have to go across the track. Am I right? Are they going to put an overpass over that? So you're taking a state route and you're going to have trucks on it and they're going to have to be on that road through that crossing? And you're not going to put an over pass over the railroad?
- Where is the Fairfield corner? With this new gate?
- Is there a plan to post any of this online at WPAFB website at all? What about all the background "stuff"? Is that available for the public?

Following the presentation, the comment portion of the meeting began. Audience members wishing to make a public statement, comment, or question were invited to fill out a speaker registration card. Audience members that submitted registration cards were called to speak in

the order their card was received. Three individuals indicated they wished to make a comment during the March 1, 2011, scoping meeting. The three speaker's comments are summarized below:

Verbal Comments

<u>Speaker 1</u>: This person is a downtown Fairborn businessperson and lifelong resident of Fairborn; comments concerned the amount of traffic at the railroad track crossing and wondered if that would be a deterrent to traffic coming into Fairborn and to the businesses there. The speaker expressed concern about the police station on one side of the track and the courthouse on the other side should the police need to get to the courthouse in a rush. The speaker agreed that diverting more traffic onto Kauffman Avenue could be beneficial to businesses but wondered what it would do to businesses on Broad Street. The speaker also noted that as the Base has changed over the years and has moved south, the gates that were closed over the years had a negative impact on businesses; as the gates closed, the businesses closed. Another concern focused on potential increased traffic using Central Avenue. The speaker indicated the goal is to make Central Avenue through the city of Fairborn more pedestrian, bicycle, and family friendly. The speaker expressed concern about increased fast traffic on that road. Another possible route of transport indicated by the speaker is that traffic would by-pass the city of Fairborn completely and use Route 4.

Speaker 2: This person indicated they have been working over 40 years to ensure bicycle and pedestrian traffic from Fairborn stayed connected to Wright State University. This person established the Buckeye Trail, a 1,444-mile trail located in the State of Ohio that runs along Kauffman Avenue in Fairborn. This speaker highlighted the North Country National Scenic Trail and the Wright Brothers Huffman Prairie Bikeway; concern regarded what would happen to these trails if Kauffman Avenue would be widened in order to handle the traffic after SR 444 closed. The speaker believed that widening Kauffman Avenue would wipe out the trails. Another concern expressed by this speaker was the levy that runs parallel with the railroad tracks from Huffman Dam and protects the railroad as well as the bikeway. The speaker indicated that the Miami Conservancy District should have a say in issues potentially involving the Huffman Dam. The speaker also expressed concern about the bike/pedestrian trail along Marl Road near the proposed truck inspection gate 26A; routing trucks down Marl Road would interfere with these trails. The speaker made a suggestion of making Kauffman Avenue three lanes wide instead of five lanes in order to preserve the existing bike trails.

<u>Speaker 3</u>: The last speaker stated that re-routing (*State Route*) 444 was a big concern since first being discussed years ago. It had always been a wait and see issue as nothing ever came from all of the talk about it. The speaker opened a bookstore on Broad Street in 1968 and grew up in that store; witnessed the decline of Broad Street due to the development of nearby Beavercreek. The speaker asked his representative, Paul Newman, if there would be an economic impact study. At this time, we are still in wait and see. We don't know what will happen to Dayton Drive or Kauffman Avenue. The speaker mentioned a preliminary study indicated it would cost \$12.8 million to widen Dayton Drive and Kauffman Avenue. The question posed by the speaker was "where will the money come from?" (at this point, an unidentified speaker said Fairborn was not in a position to do any matching funds). Speaker 3 concluded by saying the city of Fairborn

needed to begin making smart decisions and be proactive. It has been ten years of waiting and when the study comes out, the waiting will be over.

3.2 Scoping Meeting Comments, March 3, 2011

During the March 3, 2011, USAF presentation, the audience was encouraged to ask questions of clarification. There were no questions posed during the presentation.

Following the presentation, the comment portion of the meeting began. Audience members wishing to make a public statement, comment, or question were invited to fill out a speaker registration card. Audience members that had submitted registration cards were called in the order their card was received. Four individuals indicated they wished to make a comment during the March 3, 2011, scoping meeting. The four speaker's comments are summarized below:

Verbal Comments

<u>Speaker 1</u>: This speaker is a lifelong Fairborn resident that works in Area B and uses a bicycle to commute to work. This speaker's concern regarded the potential increased traffic on Kauffman Avenue and Central Avenue making the already poor bikeway conditions worse. The speaker did not think Kauffman Avenue and Central Avenue were in the condition to handle the increased traffic; things need to be done to those roads, whether or not the lanes are widened, that will impact the bikeway. The speaker did not think enough consideration had been given to pedestrian and bicycle safety, stating a belief that the poor condition of Kauffman Avenue and Central Avenue would send traffic to Route 4 and I-675. That would remove traffic from Fairborn and would not result in the business boom many people imagined.

<u>Speaker 2</u>: This speaker echoed the first speaker's thoughts/comment on the impact to the bikeway, saying the bikeway is very narrow at some areas and was concerned about safety. The speaker's other concern focused on the different routes considered for the project, saying it was hard to comment without knowing more about the alternatives. Lastly, the speaker stated concern regarding potential increased traffic on Wright and South Streets; these roads are used by people trying to avoid traffic lights along Central Avenue; this project would put more traffic along those roads.

<u>Speaker 3</u>: This speaker indicated concern about traffic particularly at the Kauffman Avenue and Huffman Dam intersection; this intersection already sees a lot of traffic and is a hazard for accidents. The speaker said Kauffman Avenue and Dayton-Yellow Springs Road are often blocked by trains, which puts more traffic on Kauffman Avenue. The speaker was concerned by the apparent attitude of the Air Force that traffic was someone else's problem and not theirs. The speaker offered a suggestion of rerouting SR 444 east of Area A and west of the railroad tracks; not knowing if that was shown as an alternative. This was an issue since with all the gates closed, what effect would that have on using the WPAFB fire department for mutual aid for the city of Fairborn and outlying areas. Lastly, the speaker indicated a concern for people who would be displaced from their property and who is responsible for that?

<u>Speaker 4</u>: This speaker owns a real estate business on Broad Street and has estimated that approximately 80% of the traffic going past this real estate office goes to the Base. The speaker did not believe that Dayton Drive would be affected as much; expressing a belief that trucks would end up on Route 4 if they need to go south and would come up SR 444 that way. The speaker did not believe the project would create a problem and she did not believe there would be much additional traffic coming down Central Avenue to Kauffman Avenue.

Court Report Comment

One individual made a statement directly to the Court Reporter as follows:

<u>Comment</u>: This commenter sympathized with the bicyclists that the bike path be preserved. But as a business owner in that area, eight years ago there were 17-18,000 cars a day on Kauffman Avenue. This is down to 11,000 today. This commenter believed the project was a good one and that Kauffman Avenue could handle the additional traffic.

AGENCY: U.S. Air Force, Air Force Material Command and 88th Air Base Wing.

ACTION: Notice of Intent.

SUMMARY: Pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969, as amended (42 United States Code 4321, et seq.), the Council on **Environmental Quality Regulations for** implementing the procedural provisions of NEPA (40 Code of Federal Regulation (CFR) Parts 1500–1508), and U.S. Air Force (USAF) policy and procedures (32 CFR part 989), the USAF is issuing this notice to advise the public of its intent to prepare an EIS to evaluate potential environmental impacts associated with the construction and operation of the proposed Entry Control Reconfiguration of Area A by Wright-Patterson Air Force Base (WPAFB). Public scoping meetings will be held to assist in identifying reasonable alternatives, potential impacts and the relative significance of impacts to be analyzed in the EIS.

The purpose and need of the proposed action is to improve security, safety, and traffic flow into and on the military base. An EIS must be prepared to evaluate the environmental impacts associated with the relocation and reconfiguration of traffic entry into Area A of the base. The proposed action includes consolidating, relocating, and reconfiguring vehicle entry control points (ECPs); upgrading the ECPs to meet current Antiterrorism/Force Protection (ATFP) standards; and extending the base perimeter fence to encompass the Kittyhawk Center, enabling it to be contiguous with Area A of the base.

The EIS will address issues associated with ECPs and the on-base roadway network located in Area A of the installation. The EIS will address primary concerns related to the ECPs and existing roadway network where State Route 444 separates the Kittyhawk Center. Another concern involves the need to consolidate the existing ECPs in Area A into a smaller set of upgraded and strategically placed gates.

The EIS will analyze three alternatives: Closure existing State Route 444 through Area A and relocation of all traffic onto Kauffman Avenue and Central Avenue via Dayton-Yellow Springs Road, realignment of State Route 444 to the east of the WPAFB Kittyhawk Center and west of the existing railroad, and the No Action alternative. Technical studies related to the proposed reconfiguration of ECPs includes biological and cultural resources impact analysis, noise and air studies, and traffic analyses. The USAF intends to use the EIS process and documentation to fulfill its National Historic Preservation Act, Section 106 consultation requirements (36 CFR 800.8).

Scoping: The USAF will hold public scoping meetings in mid January and early February at the Fairborn Council Chambers to solicit public participation in this environmental analysis. The public will be invited to participate in the scoping meetings and review the Draft Final EIS. Notification of the meeting locations, dates, and time will be made in the local area and will be announced via local news media. Information gathered during the public scoping will be used in the development of the Draft EIS.

The scoping process will help identify the full range of reasonable alternatives, potential impacts and key issues to be emphasized in the environmental analysis. Recognizing that open communication of issues is a critical element of the EIS process, the USAF and WPAFB intend to ensure that the scoping experience is meaningful and productive for all participants. Accordingly, the project team is putting strong emphasis on an EIS process that fosters beneficial dialogue and relationship building among all stakeholders, particularly those in the Fairborn community in close proximity to WPAFB. Handicap assistance and translation service will be made available; please provide requests in advance to the point of contact listed below.

Oral and written comments presented at the public scoping meetings, as well as written comments received by the USAF during this scoping period and throughout the EIS process, will be considered in the preparation of the EIS. Letters and other written or oral comments received may be published in the EIS along with the names of the individuals making the comments. (Personal home addresses and phone numbers will not be published.) As required by law, comments will be addressed in the EIS and made available to the public. Private addresses will only be used to develop a mailing list of those individuals requesting copies of the EIS.

Waterford Landing, which is a planned unit development, will bring more than 400 homes to Fairborn along with the additional park land.

"We're excited to see those new homes going in," said McDonnell. "We really are building the most in the Dayton area."

The city has also been working closely with Wright-Patterson Air Force Base on preliminary plans for the proposed re-alignment of State Route 444, tentatively scheduled for 2014. Officials anticipate this will bring positive changes for Fairborn and more businesses along Kauffman

"Businesses are going to center themselves in an area with the easiest aecess to more people," said Dautel.

The first public meetings regarding this project will be held at 6 p.m. March 1 and 3 at the Fairborn Government Center.

"We want to help residentsunderstand the positive impact this will have on them," MeDonnell added.

In light of all the positive changes, the city will still have to work under budgetary constraints. McDonnell has already found ways to reduce the cost of electricity and street lighting, but she is still looking for more ways to save money.

"We are looking at all of our contracts for supporting services to hopefully reduce costs on a lot of things," she said.

The city is looking at all of their supporting services contracts to see where costs can be

reduced. A committee has been appointed to review the health insurance benefits of employees. The city is also looking into switching to a merit pay system for employ-

"We have had to reduce the budget as well as the expectations of revenue coming in, but we are still being frugal with what money we do have to see if we can make it last longer and longer," said McDonnell. "This will lessen the burden, but there is still incredible pressure to pass a levy."

"We must try to find the fine line between reducing expenditures and maintaining a tax base," Dautel added. "The citizens have to decide the level of scrvice they want and what they are willing to pay for. Ultimately, it's the citizens' choice."



Hundreds brave cold for 'Lion King' tickets

DAYTON — More than 600 Dayton-area residents lined up outside the Schuster Center early Saturday to buy tickets for the first live performance of "The Lion King" here, according to the show's backers.

Many braved light snow and frigid overnight temperatures to be among the first to buy tickets to the award-winning production, which is based on the animated Disney movie and has been on tour for more than a decade since its Broadway debut in 1997.



Stop loss pay application window closing March 4

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas — The deadline for eligible members or legally designated beneficiaries to apply for Retroactive Stop Loss Special Pay is coming to a close March 4.

Almost 6,000 current and former Airmen have received a total of more than \$19 million in special pay since Air Force Personnel Center officials here began accepting claims in September 2009.

Airmen who were involuntarily held on active duty between Sept. 11, 2001, and Sept. 30, 2009, may be eligible for the special pay compensation of \$500 for each month they were affected. Eligibility includes active, retired and former service members as well as members of the Reserve component who served on active duty while their enlistment or period of obligated service was involuntarily extended, or whose eligibility for separation or retirement was suspended as a result of stop loss.

Claims are being evaluated based upon historical records as well as any supporting documents the applicant may submit. Officials here have received more than 10,500 claims to date with approximately 3,000 of those still pending review or approval determi-

Due to the large volume of applications received in the last few months, officials from the separations branch here are asking claimants to allow 12 weeks for processing their claims before following up.



The proposed action includes consolidating, relocating, and reconfiguring vehicle entry-control facilities (ECFs); ensuring ECFs meet current Anti-Terrorism / Force Protection (ATFP) standards; and extending the base perimeter fence to encompass the Kittyhawk Center, enabling it to be contiguous with Area A of the base.

There are currently nine ECFs in use in Area A (see Existing ECFs Map 1 below):

Gate 1A Gate 12A Gate 26A Gate 8A Gate 15A Gate 38A Gate 9A Gate 16A Gate 39A

The EIS will address issues associated with ECFs and



the on-base roadways network located in Area A of the base. The EIS will address primary concerns related to the ECFs and existing roadway network where State Route 444 separates the Kittyhawk Center. Another concern involves the need to consolidate the existing ECFs in Area A into a smaller set of upgraded and strategically-placed gates.

The EIS will analyze the proposed action, which involves relocating and reconfiguring the existing nine gates into three, upgraded, strategically-placed ECFs that meet the ATFP security requirements. Under the proposed action, the consolidated, relocated, and reconfigured gates would be referred to as Gates 1A, 15A, and 26A (see Proposed Reconfigured, Relocated, and Consolidated ECFs Map 2 below).

Alternatives for Consideration

The EIS will analyze three alternatives: closure of existing State Route 444 through Area A and relocation of all traffic onto Kauffman Avenue and Central Avenue via Dayton-Yellow Springs Road; realignment of State Route 444 to the east of the WPAFB Kittyhawk Center and west of the existing railroad; and the No Action alternative.

What is NEPA?

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) is one of the federal laws that outline policies to protect our environment. It establishes policy, sets goals, and provides a means for carrying out policy. Further, the NEPA process makes sure that environmental information is available to public officials and citizens before decisions are made and actions are taken. NEPA requires all federal agencies proposing construction activities that may significantly impact the environment to consider:

- A range of reasonable alternatives
- Environmental consequences
- Potential human health consequences
- Public and government agency input

An evaluation process, called an environmental review, is undertaken to determine whether the proposed project may have significant impact on the environment and therefore require the preparation of an EIS. NEPA emphasizes agency cooperation along with public comment and other involvement.

Scoping

The scoping process will help identify the full range of reasonable alternatives, potential impacts and key issues to be emphasized in the environmental analysis. Recognizing that open communication of issues is a critical element of the EIS process, the USAF and WPAFB intend to ensure that the scoping experience is meaningful and productive for all participants. Accordingly, the project team is putting strong emphasis on an EIS process that fosters beneficial dialogue and relationship-building among all stakeholders, particularly those in the Fairborn community and in close proximity to WPAFB.

Public scoping meetings for the EIS for Entry Control Reconfiguration proposal are being held on March 1 and March 3, 2011.

The public may make comments on the EIS proposal the following ways:

- 1. Written comments submitted at the Public Scoping Meetings, or mailed, faxed or emailed through March 18, 2011.
- 2. Oral comments made at the Public Scoping Meetings.

Comments will be accepted throughout the EIS process; however, the USAF requests that comments be submitted no later than March 18, 2011, to ensure that comments are given full consideration early in the EIS process.



My position is **FULL OPPOSITION** to the proposed plans by WPAFB to close ANY part of SR-444 between Fairborn's Dayton Drive and Huffman Dam. The argument presented by WPAFB in the name of "security", "safety", and "traffic flow" speak **contrary to ANY COMMON SENSE**. I **DO NOT** want the excess WPAFB traffic from SR-444 on MY Fairborn city streets posing an INCREASE in congestion, travel delays, and traffic safety hazards. Consider also the impaired impact to your own employees and military personnel accessing WPAFB for Kittyhawk Center, Area's A and B.

I wish someone in the lower ranks at WPAFB would be brave enough to stand up to the base commander and tell them the absurdity and waste of public money for this project. I suspect there are underlying defense contractors at the root of this to benefit short term economically.

If security is the key issue for WPAFB and the Kittyhawk Center, then you should consider closing ALL public roads within 300 feet of the perimeter of WPAFB property in Area's A and B. ALTERNATE DESIGN

Public and WPAFB personnel traffic could still continue to use SR-444 as the main high volume and high speed through-way that it currently provides for all parties involved.
