## Safety important for all when using firearms, commander says

hen in the military, we, as Soldiers, are often accustomed to being around firearms. But there is a time and place for the use of firearms. And, above all, we must remember they can be dangerous. Therefore, if important for all.

First, let me define "firearm" is firearms safety and the support of the sup

First, let me define "firearm"

as Fort Riley uses the term. pistol, rifle, shotgun or other device designed for or capable of propelling a bullet or other projectile by means of an explosive or compressed charge. This definition includes BB guns, paintball guns and airsoft of firearms brings with it an inherent

an inherent responsibility. How a user handles a firearm im-pacts the safety of all on the Clark of all on the installation. For example, an individual under the age of 18 years of age should never carry or use any firearm without the accompaniment of an adult who is responsible for the safe and lawful use of the firearm.

While personally owned firearms are permitted at Fort Riley, any user of firearms on post must abide by all regula-tions set in place. These regulations are in place to protect all of Fort Riley's residents,

Soldiers, Families, civilians and attors. At Fort Riley, three policies

At For Riley, three policies exist that regulate firearms on post. They are: Army Regulation 190-11 "Physical Security of Arms, Ammunition and Explosives," paragraph 4-5; Fort Riley Regulation 190-1 "Control of Privately Owned Firearms, Weapons, Explosives and Ammunition;" and Picerne Military Housing's Fort Riley Resident Responsibility Guide. Resident Responsibility Guide, Section 1-14. It is important to note that Picerne's RRG is nested with the Fort Riley

These regulations prescribe the responsibilities of individu-als and commanders concerning registration, storage, transport, use and control of

policy; that is, the two work in

firearms, weapons, explosives and ammunition on the instal-

lation.

The first step when dealing with firearms is to ensure they are properly registered.

Military personnel are required to register their privately-owned firearms and the firearms of their Family members with their unit commander.

Riley employees and visitors to post, must register their firearms with the Directorate of Emergency Services.

It's important to note that BB guns are required to be ered, but paintball and airsoft guns are exempt from

When storing a firearm in on-post housing, military

personnel must have writ-ten authorization from their commander to store privately owned firearms in housing. They must then be properly secured – in either a locked container or provided with a trigger lock. Ammunition for the firearm will be secured separately from the firearm in a locked container. Most importantly, it is pro-hibited to dischage any firearm within the Fort Riley military installation, except at author-

installation, except at authorized ranges and authorized areas. And Fort Riley does offer several areas to do so. Among
