#1 - Prevention of Substance Abuse and Mental Illness

- Create communities where individuals, families, schools, faith-based organizations and workplaces take action to promote emotional health and reduce the likelihood of mental illness, substance abuse...and suicide.
- Focus on the Nation's high-risk youth, youth in Tribal communities, and military families.

#5 -Health Reform

- Increase access to appropriate high quality prevention, treatment and recovery services;
- Reducing disparities that currently exist between the availability of services for mental and substance use disorders compared with the availability of services for other medical conditions; and
- Support integrated, coordinated care, especially for people with behavioral health and cooccurring health conditions, such as HIV/AIDS.



Engaging Youth in HIV/AIDS-Specific Programs

Minority AIDS Initiative (MAI)

- Youth are a MAI targeted population
 - Peer-led outreach training
 - Information and referral for services
 - HIV testing
- 5-year Capacity Building Initiative (CBI) grants
 - Prevent SA and transmission of HIV/AIDS
 - Targets youth ages 18-24
 - Colleges, universities and community-based orgs

Key Challenges

- Retention
 - Grantees report that incentives help
- Engaging families and parents
 - HIV status, sex, and drugs can be difficult topics for teens to discuss with family/parents
 - Parent education may not be feasible
- Stigma
 - May affect teens' willingness to participate
