



Of all the positions and assignments an officer can hold; Commander is the most coveted, and my time as the Commander of Kosovo Forces has by far been the most memorable for me. Contribute to maintain a Safe and Secure Environmemt and Freedom of Movement

As a result of the deterioration in the security situation north of the Ibar river, KFOR was challenged directly to confront the threat to Freedom of Movement posed by the erection of barricades on many of the main roads there. KFOR's resolve was self-evident in light of violence offered by a minority of self-interested individuals. KFOR responded to the aggression and provocations with two principles in mind: achieving the tactical objective and minimizing the number of injured. As a result of KFOR actions there is only barricade left and that is on Austerlitz Bridge in Mitrovica. Full Freedom

of Movement on all the transit roads throughout northern Kosovo has been restored.







Enhance cooperation with the Institutions in Kosovo and International Civilian Presences

The improving situation in southern Kosovo allows KFOR to transfer responsibility for the safeguarding of Religious and Cultural Heritage Sites to the Institutions in Kosovo. Following a decision by the North Atlantic Council, the responsibility for the protection of Devic Monastery was handed

over from KFOR to the KP in June 2012. This is the seventh site of nine Properties with Designated Special Status to be handed over since March 2010, the aim is to facilitate a dignified monastic culture as it has been part of Kosovo for centuries. Another significant step in fulfilling tasks of the second

line of operation took place when KFOR actions jointly with EULEX and KP, greatly assisted the OSCE facilitated balloting process during the Serbian elections in Kosovo in May. This was an example of what the International Community as a whole together with the Institutions in Kosovo can achieve.







FOUR LINES

Conduct proactive and comprehensive communications

Through coordinated actions, messages and products, at many levels, information about KFOR's plans and activities was always effectively available to local and international media representatives. Many high level meetings were organized in KFOR Headquarters, throughout Kosovo

and abroad. All these activities had a positive effect on the security situation in Kosovo. As part of the Key Leader Engagement process, KFOR leadership conducted regular meetings with the highest authorities in the Institutions in Kosovo, religious leaders, municipality representatives and city

mayors. The regular coordination of communication and cooperation with others were designed to provide coherent and harmonised support to the other three Lines of Operation.







Assist to strengthen the Kosovo Security Force / ministry of the Kosovo Security Force capabilities

KFOR's Military Civil Advisory Division (MCAD) supervises the monitoring, mentoring and advising of the KSF until the force is judged by a NAC decision to be capable of operating, in accordance with internationally-set standards, without NATO-led support. The KSF received COM-

KFOR's recommendation towards reaching Final Operational Capability (FOC) but this does not represent the end of the development of KSF. Indeed more effort is required, the KSF is still some way off the self-sustainable levels according to NATO-set standards. Notwithstanding, their performance

in assisting the civilian population is vital as evidenced in Restelica in February in a successful rescue operation during severe snows when avalanches had already claimed 10 lives in the worst winter in Kosovo since 1984.

Multinational Battle Groups

KFOR has been in almost constant transition since its arrival, downsizing in response to the increasing levels of stabilisation in the safety and security situation. This on-going process is aimed at improving the effectiveness of the forces and their ability to operate flexibly throughout Kosovo without restriction. KFOR's Task Organisation changed from four Multinational Brigades (MNB East, Centre, Northeast, Southeast) to five Multinational Task Forces (MNTF) in June 2006. In January 2010 in light of further troop reductions the MNTF's were restructured into five Multinational Battle Groups (MNBG). Slightly over a year later this was reduced to two, MNBG-East located at Camp Bonsteel and MNBG-West in Camp Villagio Italia. KFOR current strength is barely over ten per cent of the original number of fifty thousand that entered in June 1999.


Joint Regional Detachments

Liaison and Monitoring Teams (LMTs), now operated in five separate Joint Regional Detachments (JRDs). These are the forward sensors of KFOR, with its soldiers meeting daily with the inhabitants of Kosovo. This important interaction allows the LMTs to gain a timely appreciation of their feeling regarding issues on the ground.

Joint Logistic Support Group (JLSG)


