

DisasterAssistance.gov is an easy to use Web site. The site provides information from 17 Federal agencies on how you might be able to get help before, during and after a disaster.

If the President of the United States makes help available to support your state, tribal nation, territory or local jurisdiction after a disaster, you can visit this site to apply online. DisasterAssistance.gov also helps you learn what steps to take to prepare for and help keep your family safe during an emergency. Register for disaster assistance via computer and Blackberry,® iPhone,® Windows® Mobile and Android™ devices. If you do not have access to the Internet, you can also register for FEMA assistance by calling 1-800-621-3362. Disaster assistance applicants, who have a speech disability or hearing loss and use TTY, should call 1-800-462-7585 directly; for those who use 711 or Video Relay Service (VRS), call 1-800-621-3362. DisasterAssistance.gov also provides news, information and resources to help individuals, families and businesses prepare for, respond to and recover from disasters.

Go to the Site to:

1. Reduce the number of forms to fill out when you apply for assistance
2. Shorten the time it takes to apply for aid
3. Update and check the progress of your applications online
4. Identify opportunities to apply for assistance from multiple Federal agencies
