**PRIORITIZING ARMOR SCHOOL FUNCTIONAL TRAINING COURSES.** The Armor School commandant is asking for feedback on the potential impacts of functional-training budget cuts. TRA-DOC's priority is initial military training (IMT) and professional military education (PME), with functional training – such as the M1A1/M1A2 Tank Commanders Course – falling last. As a result, TRADOC funding reductions first come from functional training. TRADOC, in conjunction with the schools, developed a prioritized list of functional training. Schools have also been encouraged to find efficiencies by transferring some training to U.S. Army Forces Command (FORSCOM) and the National Guard Bureau (NGB). Two courses identified as candidates for transfer to unit training are the M1A1/M1A2 Tank Commanders Course and the Mobile Gun System (MGS) commanders Course, which are currently taught at Fort Benning. In addition, the MGS Crewman Course and the Stryker Crewman Course are under consideration for transfer to an NG Regional Training Institute (RTI). We want your input on the potential training and readiness impact these options may have on your unit as we continue to develop unique options to ensure training effectiveness during a resource constrained environment. **194<sup>th</sup> ARMORED BRIGADE: HOLIDAY BLOCK LEAVE.** Each year during the holiday season, the Armor School pauses training and sends our initial-entry training (IET) Soldiers on a two-week holiday block leave (HBL). The pause allows our cadre and training population the opportunity to enjoy the holidays and then return in the New Year ready to execute their mission. Obviously, two weeks is a significant disruption to the IET physical-training regimen, particularly for those trainees in the toughening phase of APRT. Our cadre and Musculoskeletal Action Teams (MAT) provide IET soldiers with personal workout plans to maintain fitness during HBL and minimize stress or injury when training resumes. In spite of these challenges, the 194<sup>th</sup> Armored Brigade will ensure that all warriors meet Army standards before graduation. Commanders of their first unit expect that Soldiers whose IET cycles included HBL will have a negative leave balance when they first arrive.

316<sup>th</sup> CAVALRY BRIGADE: ABOLC FOLLOW-ON TRAINING STRATEGY. Armor Basic Officer Leaders Course (ABOLC) graduates are physically fit, agile and adaptive leaders who are capable of

## From the Chief of Armor's Turret

As we close out 2012, this is a good time to update you on the key initiatives at the Armor School, to tell you what is coming in the New Year and to solicit your feedback on our initiatives.

 Linking to the operational force: We need feedback from the force so we can fight for the requirements you need and to ensure we're producing Soldiers and leaders with the right



skill sets for your units. To foster this feedback, we've initiated this informative newsletter along with our points of contact. We are now also on Facebook and Twitter; join us there for the latest news affecting Armor, Cavalry and our combined-arms brothers.

- 2. ABOLC Armor and infantry integration: Armor lieutenants should have an appreciation of what their infantry counterparts bring to the fight and vice versa. We have initiated a program that gets lieutenants from ABOLC and IBOLC together for hands-on learning with each others' systems and to conduct combined-arms training. For example, in early December, infantry and Armor lieutenants conducted combined-arms training at the Selby Combined Arms Collective Training Facility to learn how to integrate tank, Bradley and dismounted elements into their operations.
- 3. MGS master gunner: We will conduct the pilot MGS Master Gunner Course beginning 21 Jan 2013. This will shorten the time that MGS MG candidates are away from their units by two months, allowing them to contribute more during

leading platoons in any Armor or Cavalry organization. To further prepare lieutenants and to maximize training opportunities available at the Maneuver Center of Excellence (MCoE), 2-16 Cav developed a follow-on training strategy to ensure that officers may attend assignment-oriented training (AOT) in accordance with DA PAM 600-3, *Commissioned Officer Professional Development and Career Management* (01 FEB 10), and prioritized by first unit of assignment. The squadron has developed three phases of follow-on training available for lieutenants:

- The first phase is reconnaissance-focused training (Army Reconnaissance Course (ARC) and Reconnaissance and Surveillance Leader Course (RSLC)). Lieutenants assigned to an Armored Brigade Combat Team (ABCT) or Stryker BCT (SBCT) are prioritized to attend ARC, while those assigned to an Infantry BCT are prioritized to attend RSLC. Opportunities exist for many lieutenants to attend both courses, depending on their timeline.
- The second phase is assignment-specific training. Lieutenants assigned to SBCT formations have the opportunity to attend the Stryker Leader's Course, while lieutenants assigned to ABCTs will be given the opportunity to attend the Mechanized Leader Course or Tank Commander's Course. IBCT (ABN) lieutenants will attend Airborne School during this phase.
- The final phase is functional training. During this phase, lieutenants may attend Ranger, Air Assault or other schools available at Fort Benning that prepare them for their next assignment. The squadron has had great success ensuring that up to one-third of each ABOLC class has a chance to attend Ranger School, with priority going to those lieutenants assigned to IBCT or SBCT formations.

This three-phased approach to follow-on training ensures that lieutenants maximize training opportunities before reporting to their first unit. The foundational training lieutenants receive at ABOLC, coupled with the training opportunities available at the MCoE, enables the Armor School to provide the Armor and Cavalry force with tactically and technically proficient lieutenants, immediately ready to assume their platoons.

## **TRADOC Capabilities Managers**

TCM-SBCT: GROWING MGS CREWMEN. MGS operator new-equipment training (MGS OPNET) is ending. All nine SBCTs have received at least one, and in some cases two, OPNETS. Leaders are now responsible for training and certifying their own MGS crewmembers to award the R4 Additional Skill Identifier (ASI). SBCTs are experiencing greater than 85 percent turnover in 19Ks, so incoming personnel need to be brought up to speed quickly. TM 9-2355-321-10 is the resource leaders need to accomplish this task. Chapters 1-5 cover familiarization of components, principles of operation, equipment description and use, operations in usual conditions and operations in unusual conditions. Chapter 8 covers maintenance. These chapters provide the basic tasks on which platoons need to focus. Master gunners (with commanders' guidance) must develop and execute a training plan that ensures all crewmen complete live-fire prerequisite training IAW DA PAM 350-38 and culminate training with a crew live-fire qualification exercise. TCM-ABCT: DOCTRINE, ORGANIZATION AND FORCE MODERNIZATION. TCM-ABCT led the Maneuver Center of Excellence (MCoE) and Capabilities Development and Integration Directorate (CDID) team that visited 2<sup>nd</sup> Infantry Division in Korea to conduct an mine-resistant, ambushprotected (MRAP) proof-of-principle survey 7-14 Dec 12. The team visited 2 CAB, 210 FiB and 1 ABCT, and conducted panel discussions and surveys with operators, sustainers, leaders and staff to identify MRAP suitability on the Korean Peninsula. Areas of emphasis during discussions included use of the MRAP as a mission-command-on-the-move (MCOTM) node, MCOTM desired capabilities, MRAP attributes and constraints, how MRAPs were used and supported, and how MRAPs performed during field exercises. The outcome will identify doctrine, organization, training, leadership and education, personnel and facility (DOTMLPF) considerations for potential future fielding. TCM-BfSB: BATTLEFIELD SURVEILLANCE BRIGADE (BfSB) UPDATE. The structure and capabilities of the BfSBs in support of Army 2020 continues to evolve. Army Chief of Staff (ACoS) GEN Ray Odierno has directed the development and analysis of two potential courses of action (COAs) for organization(s) responsible for collecting intelligence on the future battlefield. COA 1 is the development of a new reconnaissance and security (R&S) organization based on a SBCT or ABCT. COA 2 is augmenting an existing SBCT or ABCT with specific organizations / capabilities harvested from the existing BfSBs to perform the R&S mission. While these COAs appear almost identical, they will differ in operational control, structure and capabilities. In accordance with guidance from MG H.R. McMaster, MCoE commanding general, the MCoE Capabilities Development Division (CDD), with TCM-BfSB in support, will be coordinating two "how to fight" seminars in February and March 2013. These seminars will look at everything from the BCT structures, R&S mission-essential task list (METL), training and potential fiscal impacts to determine which COA would likely best serve the Army's R&S needs. The seminars' goal is to develop the information that will be briefed to the ACoS, which will lead to a decision on R&S's future and the organization that must execute it as a part of Army 2020. their units' train-ready phase.

- 4. Getting scouts under armor: We are exploring a short-term solution to get our scouts under armor using existing Bradleys as well as a longer-term solution. For the IBCT scouts, we are still looking to determine the right platform, but acknowledge that the HMMWV and M-ATV are not suitable. Our TRADOC capabilities managers (TCMs) are working to develop the best course of action until we find a suitable platform.
- 5. Reconnaissance Summit 2013: This year's Reconnaissance Summit is currently scheduled 6-8 March. We have sent out "save the date" invitations to all invitees; we will send official invitations following final TRADOC approval. If invited, please consider attending as we are looking for valuable input to inform the development of reconnaissance gaps and recommend solutions across DOTMLPF for all BCTs.
- Sullivan Cup 2013: The next Sullivan Cup Best Tank Crew competition will be in 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter FY13. Look for more information this spring, as we will begin planning soon.
- 7. Gainey Cup 2013: The Gainey Cup Best Scout Team competition is 1-5 March 2013. We have invited a team from each division and separate BCT, along with three ARNG teams, to compete.

Finally, I'd like to wish everyone a happy holiday season and, as always, thank you for your service in the past year. Please take a moment to remember our brothers and sisters who are not at home and keep them in your thoughts. If you are with family, please enjoy the time, as we all know how precious that is. 2013 holds a lot of promise for the mounted force – so come back from the holidays recharged, refreshed and ready to roll.
