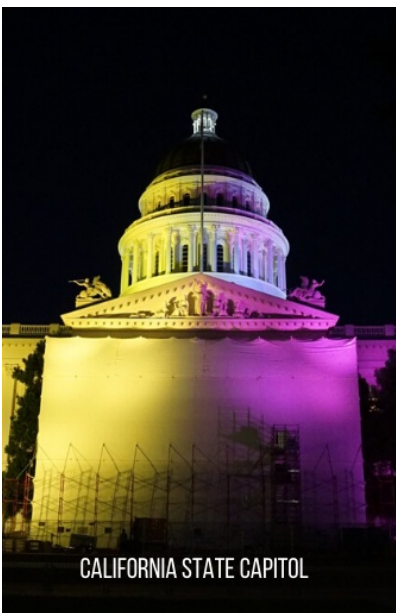
August is National Women's Suffrage Month



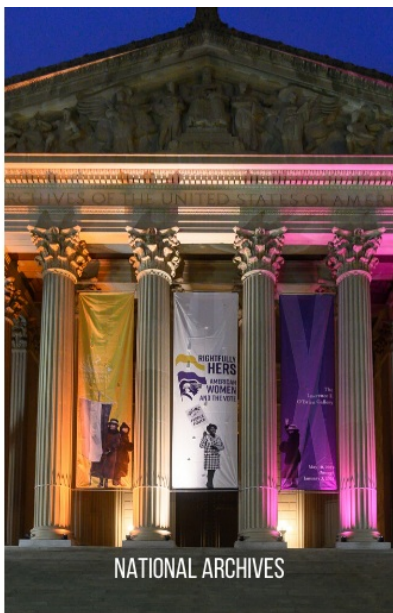
In collaboration with the WSCC, the U.S. Senate passed a bipartisan resolution designating August 2020 as National Women's Suffrage Month. Led by Senators Tammy Baldwin (D-WI) and Susan Collins (R-ME), and cosponsored by all 26 women senators, the resolution commemorates the 100th anniversary of the ratification of the 19th Amendment. In recognition of National Women's Suffrage Month, throughout August, the WSCC and its partners will convene conversations with museums, institutions, and historical sites across the country to spark a national dialogue about suffrage history and its legacy. Skydiving for Suffrage



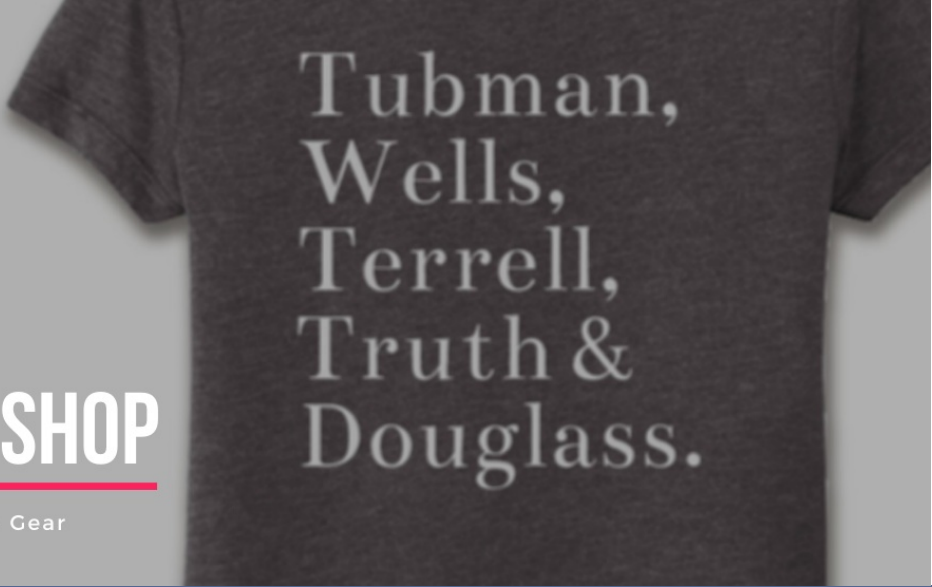
